"No statement to make beyond that, I'd rather you said as little as possible. You can say a little ion connected with Imperial Defence."

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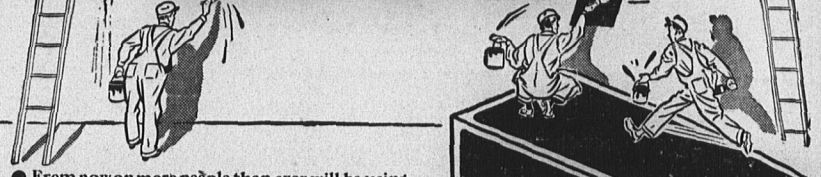

CHICKEN CRANBERRY MOLD

1 package lemon jelly
2 cups hot water
1-2 cup chopped celery
1-2 cup chopped raw cranberries

METHOD: Dissolve the jelly in the hot water. Add the salt and place the jelly in the refrigerator until it sets to the consistency of honey. Now add the cooked chicken, cooked peas, chopped celery, and the chopped raw cranberries. Mix thoroughly and then pour into oiled and rinsed molds. Place in the refrigerator to set, or until ready to serve. Unmold on crisp lettuce and garnish with salad dressing.
