**NEW USES FOR THE AUTOMOBILE.**

A witty P. E. Island farmer is credited with saying that "the automobile ought to mow hay but will not." We think it all right for the horses to continue the work of mowing, as they eat the hay which the mowing machine helps to produce. The auto does not eat hay, and in fact, unlike the horse, it does not eat anything at all except when actually working. This fact is being considered by the many who would like to keep their own carriages, but hesitate over the expense of feeding a horse throughout the year. A number of our citizens intend purchasing autos as soon as the price is brought down to more reasonable figures. But to return to our farmer.

The latest issue of the Scientific American, discussing the various uses of the automobile, shows by illustration how it can be and is being used for various agricultural purposes. All that is required in the way of change is another set of wheels, with broad tires, to prevent sinking into the soft earth, and with projections on the hind wheels like those of the

drivers of a reaper or mower to prevent slipping, and the auto will draw a plow, harrow, cultivator, roller of other farm machine as well as a pair of horses. The Scientific American shows an auto-carriage in the form of a double-seated covered vehicle, in which the driver is comfortably sheltered from the sun while the machine is drawing a two-horse cultivator. When done with its day's work in the field the carriage wheels can be quickly replaced and the machine is never too tired to run an errand or take the family out for an evening's pleasure drive.

As is well known the auto car has been extensively adapted for use in war, for running upon railway tracks, and for heavy trucking in cities as well as for carrying passengers, and for use as a private family carriage. Thus it bids fair at an early day to become one of the most variedly useful of modern machines.

We have received the official crop bulletin for July 20 issued by the Government of the North-West Territories.
