Portia White Heard In Fine Vocal Concert

A most delightful recital of vocal music was given last night in the Prince of Wales College hall to a capacity—or, one should rather say, more than capacity audience, for extra chairs had to be provided to seat all who came. The talented recitalist was Miss Portia White, and her accompanist was the gifted pianist, Dr. George Brough, who is familiar to Charlottetown musicians, as this is his second appearance here in that capacity.

The exceedingly well chosen programme was as follows: 1. Kemm Sussler Tod (Bach); Come Again (Dowland); Plaisir d'Amour (Martini); The Lass with the Delicate Air (Arne). 2. "Voce di Donna"; Aria from "La Gioconda" (Ponchielli); "O Don Faiale"; Aria from "Don Carlos" (Verdi). 3. Aufenthal (Schubert); Litanie auf das Fest Aller Seelen (Schubert); Wiegelnied (Brahms); Der Schmied (Brahms). 4. Piano group (selected). 5. A Swan (Grieg); I Love Thee (Grieg); Clorinda (Orlando Morgan); I Wonder As I Wander (Kentucky Folk Song); A May Day Carol (arr. Deems Taylor). 6. Swing Low, Sweet Chariot (arr. Burleigh); You Gonna Reap (arr. Miller); Rock Me, Julie (arr. Burleigh); Let Us Break Bread Together (arr. Lawrence).

In addition, in response to most hearty and enthusiastic applause, Miss White favored her audience with the following encore numbers—all being spirituals: "Oh, what a Beautiful City" (arr. Bookner); "Deep River" (arr. Burleigh); "Little David, Play On Your Harp" (arr. Burleigh); and "Sweet Little Jesus Boy" (McGinsey).

Miss White possesses a high contralto, indeed, almost mezzo soprano voice of great range, power and flexibility. This was particularly displayed in the two operatic arias she sang. While this listener does not particularly care for this form of vocal art, he nevertheless cannot but praise the way in which Miss White executed them. The Schubert leader were much liked by the audience, as was also the justly popular Brahms Wiegelnied.

But it was undoubtedly in the group of American songs and spirituals that Miss White felt most at home, and these, too, were most appreciated by her audience, as evidenced by their rapt attention while they were being sung, and their hearty applause at the end of every number. Most wisely, Miss White chose some of the less well-known but nevertheless most beautiful and moving of these for the many encores her audience required of her.

Dr. Brough, who accompanied Miss White so beautifully, is a musician of great taste and distinction. For his group of piano solos, he chose a Sonata of Scarlatti, followed by the Adagio from the Sonata Pathétique of Beethoven; a piece by Jacques Ibert called "Little White Donkey" and "Jesus, Joy of Man's Desiring" by Bach. All were well and justly played, but the Bach and Beethoven pieces seemed particularly pleasing.

It only remains to add, that the thanks of the music loving public of Charlottetown are due, not only to the recitalist herself, but to the Charlottetown Baptist Choir, under whose sponsorship this very fine recital was given.

Presbytery Meeting

The Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in regular session in Hearst Memorial Hall, Trinity Church, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, February 17, with the chairman, Rev. T. E. MacLennan, presiding.

The devotions were conducted by Rev. Dr. A. D. MacKenzie, who delivered an inspiring address on "The Meaning of the Cross."

Presbytery was then constituted with prayer by the chairman. There was an attendance of forty-five ministers and laymen, practically every charge being represented.

It was moved, seconded and carried that all members of other Presbyteries present be invited to sit and correspond. It was learned with regret that the superintendent of Home Missions, Dr. W. S. Godfrey would not be able to meet with Presbytery due to illness.

The secretary read the agenda and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded and carried. The minutes of the previous meeting of the executive were read and approved.

On motion, Rev. W. B. Crowe was appointed assistant secretary, and Rev. J. H. MacCallum, reporter for the present session.

The secretary reported for the Murray Fund, and the Maritime Lay Association Bursary for Pine Hill.

It was moved, seconded, and carried, that the Presbytery adjourn at 5:15 and reconvene at 7:15 p.m.

Mr. MacLennan announced that supper would be served at 5:30 in the Social Hall.

It was agreed that committees should meet at the supper recess. The secretary then read the correspondence. Mr. A. J. Matheson spoke regarding the proposed sale of a piece of land belonging to the O'Leary Pastoral Charge. This was referred to the Committee on Church Property.

Rev. K. G. Sullivan presented the report of the committee on Christian Education. He presented Rev. John Jarvis, who spoke in the interests of the Church School Crusade. This Crusade he called the "three E" plan for enriching and enlarging the Church School through evangelism, thus bringing the Sunday School into closer contact with Jesus Christ. He stressed the necessity of sharing with others what the Church has to offer, and the commitment of every scholar and teacher to Christ. The Sunday School is not separate from the Church. It is definitely a part of the Church.

Through the great work of the Sunday School, the parents in the home could understand and appreciate the part they must play in the Christian education of their children.

Rev. A. S. Weir reported for the Property Committee; Rev. K. G. Sullivan for the Committee on Education of Students; Rev. D. W. MacPherson for the M. and M. Committee; Rev. A. S. Adams for the Pension Fund; Rev. R. E. Vessey for the Publications Committee; Rev. S. M. McDowell for the Committee on Records; Rev. R. L. Wagner for the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

Rev. E. R. MacVicar, chairman of the Statistical Committee, reported that the United Church on the Island had enjoyed a successful year spiritually and materially. This very fine report was well received, and Mr. MacVicar was highly commended by the chairman on his efficient, careful, and conscientious work. On motion of Mr. MacVicar, duly seconded and carried, the Statistical Report was adopted.

Rev. Wm. T. Mercer reported for the Committee on Evangelism and Social Service. This report provoked much interesting discussion and after several amendments had been made it was adopted.

Rev. R. L. Wagner, reporting for the Committee on Remits, reported in the affirmative on a remit from General Council, and a referendum from General Council. The Presbytery concurred.

The secretary, Rev. W. A. MacQuarrie, extended the appreciation and thanks of Presbytery for his inspiring and interesting address over the Trans-Canada CBC Church of the Air services on Sunday, February 1.

Rev. G. A. Penz, M.A., minister of J. Wesley Smith Memorial United Church, Halifax, was nominated as the Presbytery choice for next president of the Maritime Conference.

An interesting discussion took place regarding the United Churchman, and many took part in the debate. Mr. C. H. Black made a strong plea on behalf of the paper, urging that each minister and congregation get as many subscriptions as they could, so that the paper continue as it now is, a great source of inspiration and spiritual nourishment for the people of our Church.

Rev. Dr. MacKenzie then addressed the Presbytery, making a stirring and eloquent plea for utter consecration of self to Christ, and that God must have the pre-eminence place in the hearts and lives of all His people.

Presbytery then adjourned, to meet again in May at the call of the executive. The chairman pronounced the benediction. (Patriot please copy)
