His death is a distinct loss to his wife and seven children. Deceased was a man who carried with him and always displayed strong moral convictions. He possessed a rare combination of rich and various qualities of mind and heart. Truthfulness, sincerity and honesty were his strong points of character. In all his dealings with his fellow-men the purity of his motives and purposes were ever beyond reproach. Those who knew Mr. McCarthy will long feel the loss of a man of more than ordinary charm. To his wife and family, also his parents, brothers and sisters is tendered heartfelt sympathy.

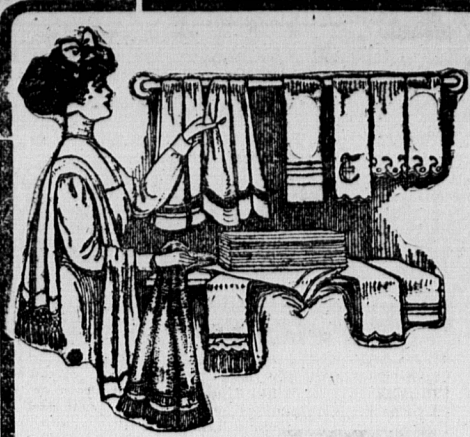
Post Card Projector
