CHICAGO, June 6.—Wheat, No. 2 red, \$1.27 to \$1.28; No. 2 hard, \$1.32 1/2 to \$1.33. Corn, No. 2 yellow, 72 1/2 c. to 73 c.; No. 4 yellow, 71 1/2 c. to 72 c.; Oats, No. 3 white, 49 1/2 c. to 49 3/4 c.; Standard, 50c. to 50 1/4 c. Rye, nominal. Barley, 72c. to 75c. Timothy, \$5 to \$4.75. Clover, \$8.50 to \$13.50. Pork, \$17.80. Lard, 9.60. Ribs, \$9.87 to \$10.37.

CHICAGO, June 1.—Uncertainty in regard to foreign relations brought down the price of wheat again today. The market closed at about 3c below that of yesterday. Corn dropped 2c and oats about 1c a bushel. The Argentine crop is playing a considerable part in the market at the present time.

WINNIPEG, June 1.—Weakness in the grain market was conspicuous today in Winnipeg. Crop conditions were reported as good and the export business has almost altogether fallen off. A fair demand exists for low grade oats and also for barley.

MONTREAL, June 1.—The feature of the market to-day was decline in the price of oats which dropped 2 1/2 c. At this price there was some demand and forty thousand changed hands. The price of hogs dropped 5c per lb. Today, but the feeling is that there will be no further decline.

EGGS: The receipts of eggs today were 3,199 cases as compared with 1,389 for the corresponding date a year ago. The enquiry from foreign buyers for Canadian eggs is increasing but the prices seem to be too high. There was however a fair amount of business done for local account.

DAIRY PRODUCE: The butter market is quite steady and the cheese firm. Local stocks of butter are smaller than a year ago and cheese larger. There was no change in the prices.

CHICAGO, June 3.—Oklahoma reports that an inch of rain had fallen in the last twenty-four hours and that unless there was a let-up the harvest would be impaired advanced wheat to-day from 1c. to 1 1/2 c. per bushel.

### THE MARKETS

#### CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS

There was little change in the price of corn or oats.

WINNIPEG, June 3.—The wheat market was closed to-day. The receipts yesterday were 82 cars. There was an excellent demand for Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4 grades of wheat by exporters, presumably to fill old contracts. There was nothing doing in oats, barley or flax.

TORONTO, June 3.—Wheat market reacted sharply to-day, going up 2c to 3c. Reports in crop conditions seem to be the chief influence in the rise. Local business is still very quiet. Other grains remained about the same.

MONTREAL, June 3.—The feature of the market to-day was the advance in wheat. The local market for oats was steadier to-day at the recent decline in prices. No. 3 Canadian Western being quoted at 65c.; extra No. 1 feed at 65c.; No. 1 feed at 63c. and No. 2 feed at 62c.

A fair volume of business continues to be done in baled hay for local account and the tone of the market remains firm with sales of car lots of No. 1 hay at \$21 to \$21.50 and No. 2 hay at \$20 to \$20.50 per ton ex-track. There was no new development in local hog situation to-day, prices being steady but advices received from Toronto yesterday stated that the market for live hogs was firmer and prices a little higher, which indicates that although supplies have been somewhat larger of late they are all wanted by packers owing to the large trade being done in smoked meats for export account.

The receipts of butter to-day were 3,946 packages as against 4,638 for the same day last week and 4,180 for the corresponding date a year ago. There was no change in the condition of the market to-day, prices being about steady. A weaker feeling was noted in the cheese to-day on account of the easier prices ruling in the country yesterday and the large supplies coming forward, and in consequence prices at the auction sale held to-day were 7/8 c. lower per lb. than this day week.

Butcher cattle were in good demand to-day and prices remained firm. The stocker trade has been quiet all this week. Good milch cows were in steady demand.

EGGS: There was a fairly good demand from grocers and other dealers for small lots to fill actual requirements. The tone of the market remains steady. The receipts to-day were 4,452 cases as against 2,897 for the same day last week.

#### GERMANY THROWS OUT BAIT TO JEWS.

LONDON, June 5.—According to Le Matin, Paris Germany is throwing out a bait to the Jews by promising to re-establish the kingdom of Palestine after the war. A scheme outlined and signed by 25 Germans and Austrian rabbis and also by Herr Ballin of the Hamburg-American line undertakes to re-establish, in agreement with the Sultan, a Jewish kingdom with guarantees of neutrality. At present the Turks have machine guns on Mont Carmel.
