### THE PRODUCTION OF TIMOTHY SEED (Experimental Farm Note)

At the Dominion Experimental Station, Kapuskasing, Ontario, an experiment has been conducted for a period of years, in order to compare the yield and quality of timothy seed produced from seeding broadcast in combination with red clover, broadcast alone, in rows 12 inches apart, and in rows 24 inches apart.

The plot seeded with a mixture of timothy and red clover was cut for hay the first and saved for seed the second; the idea being that the red clover would have largely died out and consequently the stand would be mostly timothy.

The seed produced the second year from the plot that was sown with red clover and timothy has usually been more or less of a mixture, as a percentage of the red clover remained in the plot. On the other hand a good crop of hay was obtained from the mixed plot, during the first year and the seed harvested the second year can in most cases be satisfactorily separated with a good fanning mill, as these seeds differ considerably in size and weight. In this way it might often be possible to avoid buying a selected area that had produced a crop of mixed hay the previous year.

The average results show that there is not much difference between that seeded broadcast and in rows, and considering the fact that fields sown in rows are more apt to become weedy unless cultivated, which would increase the cost of production, it would appear that the broadcast method is to be preferred.

The second-year meadow has tended to give a larger yield of seed than the new meadow, as the average production of all second-year plots is 4 bushels and 43 pounds per acre, while the average production of the first-year plots is 3 bushels and 36 pounds per acre.

According to local people who were on the pilgrimage to the Shrine last week there were seven other cures. One was a little Antigonish girl who had not walked since her infancy following an attack of infantile paralysis. Another case was that of a young girl who could not speak from birth but who suddenly started to cry out, "Good St. Anne," and turning to her mother talked for the first time in her life.

### FIRST BLUEBERRIES SHIPPED TO BOSTON

YARMOUTH, N. S., July 21—The first blueberry shipment of the season to Boston, was made recently, when three crates from the Annapolis Valley were forwarded by the steamer Yarmouth. The first from Yarmouth County were brought in later.

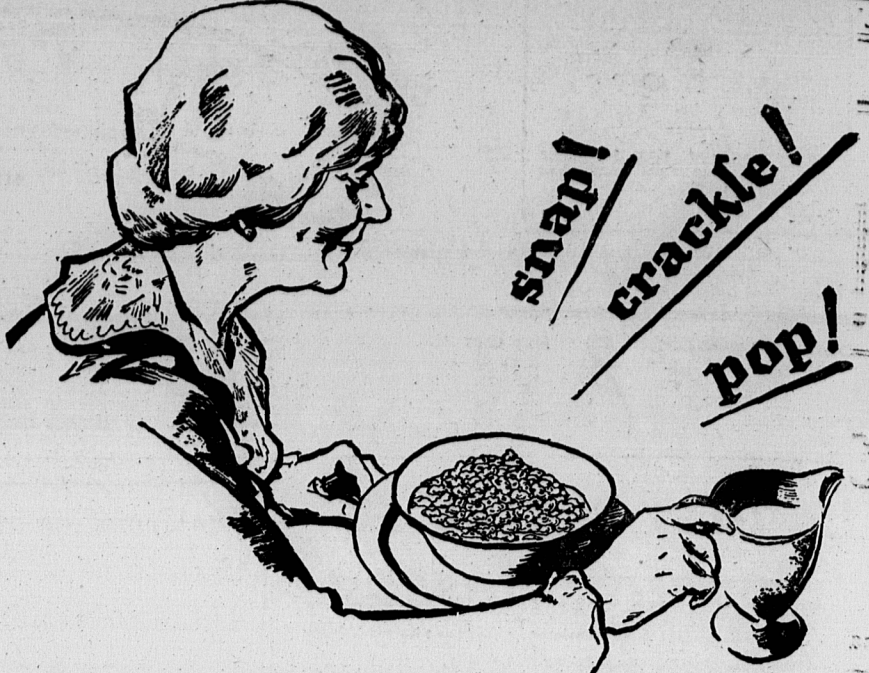
The outlook for a large shipment this year is reported favorable. Last year, during which all records for quantity and price for Nova Scotia berries were broken, the first shipment was made on July 20, when four crates of blueberries were sent to Boston.

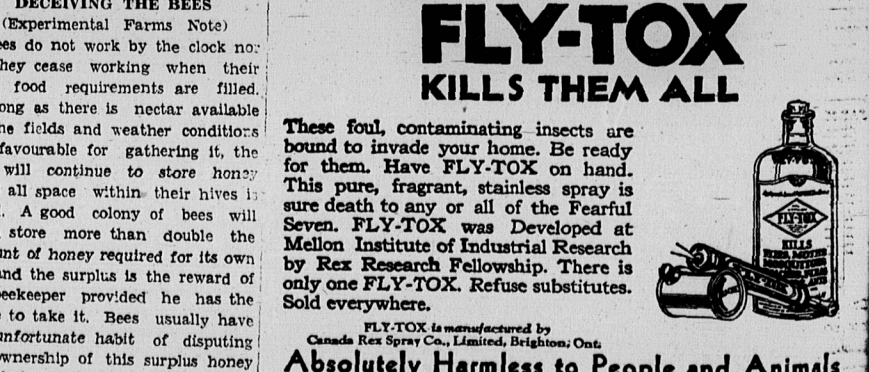
