The Bantams being varied in feather form a prominent and splendid display.

The turkeys, ducks and geese are varied in their different classes and discounting their noise, they show the different kinds of these fowl that are the most useful. The eggs and dressed poultry deserve special mention as this display is one of the best that has ever been shown. The public should take every advantage to see this representation of the different breeds of fowl that are on Prince Edward Island and it should be of particular interest to the school children.
