The Markets

MONTREAL, Aug. 15.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain market today buyers showing little desire to purchase until the new crop arrives. A small quantity of American wheat was sold. A moderate amount of business was done in Canadian western oats in the domestic market and values were unchanged.

Business in spring and winter wheat grades began at stand still. The inquiry for all lines of millfeed was good and the undertone was steady. The market for standard grades of rolled oats was firm under a moderate demand.

Further strength developed in the butter market today and values were marked up another 1-4 c to 1-2 c per pound. The demand was fair. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 37c per pound. The receipts were 1,310 packages. Extreme dullness marked the cheese trade and prices were irregular. Western grades were quoted at 19-14 cents per pound and Eastern quality at 18-3-4 cents per pound. The receipts were 6,342 boxes. The trade in eggs was fair and prices were well maintained. The receipts were 1,294 cases.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 15.—(Eggs)—Under continued light receipts Canadian egg markets are working firmer. At a number of centres storage stock beginning to meet current requirements.

TORONTO—This market is firm and unchanged. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered extras 38-39, firsts 35-36, seconds 29-30.

MONTREAL—The egg market here is firm with a good demand and light receipts prices are advancing. Sales are being made in a jobbing way at extras 43, firsts 40, seconds 33.

WINNIPEG—With receipts falling off rapidly the market has taken a sharp advance and dealers are now quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, extras 36-37, firsts 32-33, seconds 28-29 with an allowance of 30 cents on empty cases.

CALGARY—The egg situation here is quiet. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 32, firsts 30, seconds 25.

VANCOUVER—This market is unchanged since the last advance with dealers quoting producers for ungraded eggs delivered, extras 34, firsts 32, pullet extras 30. Receipts are now quite light and some firms are using storage supplies.

Livestock Report

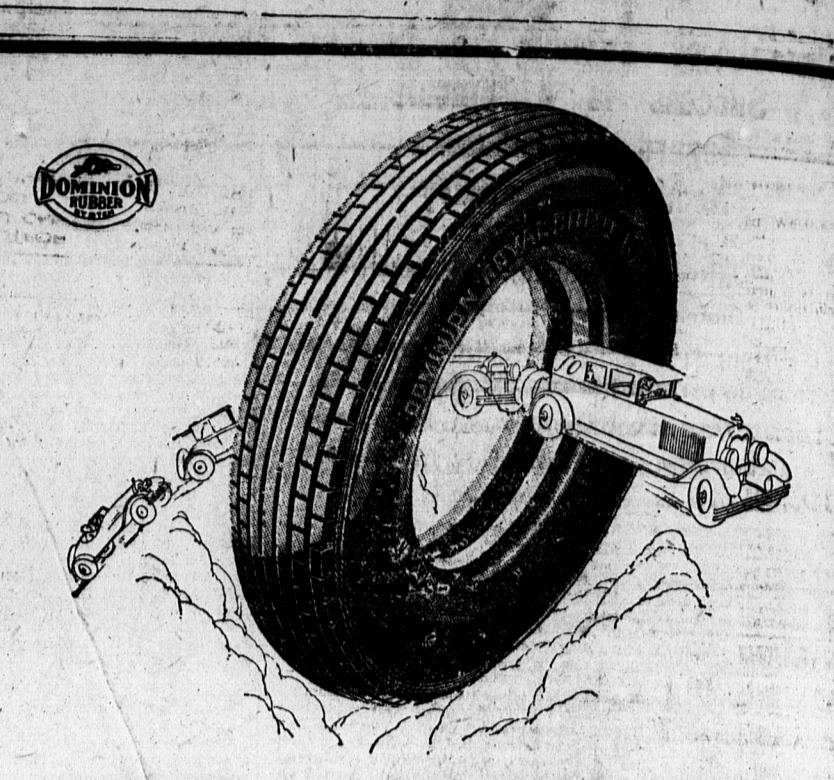
MONTREAL, Aug. 15.—Cattle receipts 1,603, included in this ofering was 830 bulls. These sold from \$3.50 to \$4.00 for the common ones weighing less than 900 pounds and \$4.25 to \$4.50 for the common heavier ones. Trading in butcher cattle was slow in starting but early sales indicated prices nearly steady with last week. A few lots of good steers were sold from \$2.90 to \$7.50. Two cars fat northwest commons sold at \$5.50 and few other good picked out made the same figure. Common cows sold \$3.50 to \$4.25 and mediums \$4.50 to \$5.25. Canners were plentiful at \$2.25 to \$2.75. Quotations: Butcher steers choice, good \$7.75; medium \$6.75 to \$7.25, common \$5.00 to \$6.25; butcher heifers medium \$5.00 to \$6.25, common \$4.00 to \$5.75; butcher cows good \$5.50; medium \$3.75 to \$5.25; canners \$2.25 to \$2.75; cutters \$3.00 to \$3.50; butcher bulls, common \$3.50 to \$4.50. Calf receipts 2,278. Calves were from 50 to 75 cents higher. Straight lots good veal were sold from \$11.25 to \$12.00 and medium kinds \$10.00 to \$11.00. Quebec grass calves sold from \$5.00 to \$6.50 with the bulk \$5.50 and up. Heavier calves in fair flesh brought \$7.00 to \$9.00. Quotations: Good veal \$10.00 to \$11.00, medium \$9.00 to \$10.50, common \$7.00 to \$8.00, grass \$5.00 to \$6.50. Sheep receipts 3,297. The lamb market was slow. The bulk were of common to medium quality. A few better lots brought \$10.75 and small lots \$11.00. About 300 ewes and wethers of just fair quality were sold for \$11.50 and one carload slightly better ones \$11.75 when graded bucks were discounted \$2.00 per cwt. Sheep \$3.00 to \$5.00 for the bulk. Common lambs were \$9.00 to \$9.50. Quotations: Ewes \$3.00 to \$5.00 lambs, good \$10.75 to \$11.75, common \$9.00 to \$10.00. Hog receipts 3,215. Hogs were lower. Over 2,500 of the hogs offered were too light, weighing 150 pounds and less and these were not wanted. About 600 fair to good hogs were sold for \$10.75. Indications are that the 2,500 lights would either be left over or sell at from \$1.50 to \$2.00 or more per cwt. discount. Sows were \$7.50 to \$8.00.
