A PRIVATE picnic party was held at Rocky Point yesterday afternoon. The party left the city in the 2 o'clock boat and returned in the 7.30 boat. The members report a very pleasant outing.

At the police court yesterday, William Ellsworth, charged with the larceny of brass fittings, and being drunk and disorderly, was remanded till the 7th September, on both charges, and for further evidence in the larceny charge. John McRie was fined \$2 or 10 days for drunkenness. Forty-four cases were heard and disposed of during the month as follows:—Drunks, 31; malicious injury to property, 1 conviction; larceny, 1 conviction and one dismissal; Lig. Reg. Act., 1 conviction and two dismissals; assault, 2 convictions; nuisance, 3 convictions; vagrancy, 2 convictions. The total receipts of the month, including dog tax, were \$265.51.

A friend who is fond of giving into the "past" handed the "GUARDIAN" the following item: "On the night of October 1841, a respectable man living at Lot 38 (name omitted) left his brother's public house, Charlottetown, and started for home, going by the Malpeque Road. The man was intoxicated and the horse probably having been allowed to fast during the day, on getting beyond the city limits, began grazing by the road-side, with the result that the cart was upset. Early next morning the lifeless body of the unfortunate man was found under it. Deaths from intoxicating were not rare in the days and the incident is given to show the working of a peculiar English law, since abrogated. On it being decided that the cart had been the direct cause of the owner's death, a "dead-end" of one shilling was exacted of it, which was of course paid by some relative or friend of the deceased. In case some young reader should fail to comprehend the meaning of dead-end, let me explain, that it was an old English Law, to the effect that any personal chattel which caused the death of a human being, was forfeited to the crown to be sold, and the proceeds given away as charity. The word is derived from the Latin Deo and dandum—(literally meaning given to God) and was originally an atonement to God for the untimely death of one of His creatures. Perhaps some GUARDIAN reader can produce another instance of the application of dead-endum."
