U. S. Cruiser Now In Port

The U.S.S. Fresno, an \$200 million modern cruiser, arrived in Charlottetown harbour yesterday afternoon and dropped anchor at the three tides opposite historic Port Edward. "Fresno" is here on a three day goodwill visit and will be open for inspection to the public on Monday when boats will take visitors from the Marine wharf to the ship. The American warship is commanded by Capt. W. H. Michael, U.S.N.

During the afternoon Capt. Michael, accompanied by Lieut. Murray Waymouth (R.O.N.) of H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte, made five calls on His Honour Lieut. Governor J. A. Bernard, Premier J. Walter Jones and His Worship Mayor B. Earle MacDonald.

Today Capt. Michael will receive these officials aboard ship during a return courtesy call. Lieut. Governor will be accompanied by his aides-de-camp, Lieut. Col. P. S. Fielding, M.M., E.D.; Lieut. Robert MacMillan, D.S.C. and bar and Squadron Leader Charles Trainor, D.S.O., D.F.C. and bar. The Premier will be accompanied by Attorney-General P. E. James and the Mayor by City Clerk James A. Pullerton.

A few hours after "Fresno" dropped her anchor, the city had a friendly invasion from several hundred of Uncle Sam's sailors. Last night the ship's company was entertained at a dance given in the Armouries by the provincial government. Music for the occasion was provided by Al Blanchard and his orchestra.

Trailer Home Solves Housing Problem For U. S. Visitors

Mr. M. C. Carmichael, Belmont Mass., has solved the housing shortage or lack of hotel accommodation with a trailer that has all the latest in modern conveniences. Early this week Mr. and Mrs. Carmichael and their children accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Matheson and their two children rolled into the city with a 31 foot trailer weighing three tons. They were commencing a tour of the island after travelling the Nova Scotia mainland and the island of Cape Breton. Mr. Carmichael hails from St. Anne's, C. B.

The Mathesons are from this Province. Mr. Matheson was formerly of Dundas and Mrs. Matheson from Caledonia. They now live in Waterbury, Mass. While here they were visiting with Mrs. Matheson's father, Mr. M. J. Stewart, and were guests at Belmont Lodge. Mrs. W. J. Andrew is a sister of Mr. Matheson.

Designed by Curtis-Wright, builders of the Flying Fortress, the trailer is believed to be the largest ever to travel in this Province. It contains a bed-room, closet, bathroom with all the fixtures including a shower, a gas operated stove (Propane), a combination electric and ice refrigerator, a breakfast room which at night can be converted into an extra sleeping quarters. Ventilators keep the "trailer home" at even temperature.

Drawn by a Buick the travelling home can cruise at 50 m.p.h.

FATALITY OCCURS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 - (AP) - Two pilots were killed last night in the crash of a light bomber 15 miles west of Fairfax, Va., the United States Air Force reported tonight.

The plane had been en route from Bolling Field, Washington, to Lockbourne Air Force base, Cleveland, Ohio, when it crashed.

MONTREAL, Aug. 20 - (CP) - Two Provincial police officers who travelled 125 miles by jeep, horse-drawn cart and on foot in the bush country north of Port Coulonge, 50 miles north of Ottawa, reported today that Arthur Asselin died a natural death.

The body of Asselin, 37 years old, was found Sunday in an abandoned shack at the Foran Lake dam.

"We satisfied ourselves that Asselin, who was caretaker at the hunting and fishing pavilion of Douglas D. Finlay of Carleton Place, Ont., died of natural causes," said detective Paul Coulombe of the homicide squad.

To conduct his investigations he was accompanied by Romeo Forget, Provincial police inspector, and Joseph Soucy of Port Coulonge, brother-in-law of Asselin, and traffic officer L. A. Young of Hull, Que.

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 19 - (CP) - Twenty war veterans have undergone delicate prefrontal lobotomy brain tissue operations here in the last year to restore mental balance and prepare them for psychiatric training. Dr. E. S. Goddard, chief psychiatrist, said it was too early to tell fully what results had come from the attempts to return the men to normalcy, as two to three years of study and training are required before they can be released as cured.

Grain Cutting Begun In Province

The cutting-curing and storing of the hay crop has been practically completed, a Department of Agriculture official said last night. Owing to the scarcity of farm labour and intermittent rains, there are, however, hundreds of acres of clover which will have to be ploughed and green feed. He said, will not be wasted since its ploughing down will add nitrogen and humus to the soil.

Many fields of grain are ripe enough to be cut, indeed several fields are already in stock and with all grain filled to capacity, coupled with the fact that the grain acreage is much larger this year than last, the Province expects to be the largest grain crops in its history.

Some of the grain fields which were badly damaged by last week's propellers and rain storm will be cut and stored as green feed so that the financial loss by reason of the storm will be practically negligible. Blight has struck the potato fields in some sections but the official said there were more potatoes in those areas where the growers had not sprayed so frequently as they might have. However, he added, the potato crop never looked better and the overall picture is one of the most encouraging in the agricultural history of the Province.

NEW YORK, Aug. 20 - (AP) - Russian consul-general Jacob Lomakin told reporters "you are wasting your time gentlemen," when asked today for comment on the United States demand that he leave the country.

"I have nothing to say," he added.

Lomakin was interviewed briefly as he left the consulate this morning. He had spent the night there, presumably after leaving the United States charges against him and the recall demand in the note sent to the Soviet Embassy in Washington last night.

Case Not Closed - As for the Kasenkina case, McDermott said it is not closed. He called attention to the American request for two letters written by Mrs. Kasenkina.

The United States action apparently puts Lomakin on an extremely hot spot. He will lose his official status here in a few days by order of President Truman. If he goes home to Russia, American diplomats believe, he will be in bad trouble for having bungled the refugee school teacher case; if he doesn't leave the United States, unless of course he wants to join the ranks of the Red Russian refugees which no one here expects. In New York, Lomakin declined to discuss his situation.

The action against Lomakin was part of a three front attack by the United States last night and today against Russia in the diplomatic-propaganda battle between Washington and Moscow over Russian refugee school teachers.

They are Mr. and Mrs. Mikhail I. Samarin and Mrs. Kasenkina.

The note gave a sensational, but not wholly unexpected twist to the drama which began when the teachers decided not to go home last July 31 and which hit a high peak of excitement when Mrs. Kasenkina escaped from Lomakin's consulate headquarters eight days ago by jumping out of a third-floor window.

The Russians had filed three major notes charging American authorities with helping a private organization, the Tolstoy Foundation, to "kidnap" the teachers; "surrender" of the teachers was

Against this background Marshall launched his counter-attack sending to the Soviet Embassy last night the note which the State Department made public today. The three major points of this note are:

1. The State Department is requesting President Truman to revoke Lomakin's "exequatur" - credentials to operate in the United States. It requests of the Soviet Government that he leave the United States within a reasonable time. Later the White House took some of the speed out of the ouster by announcing Truman would delay signing the exequatur revoker for a few days to allow Lomakin to close out his affairs.

2. The Russian charge that the Tolstoy Foundation kidnaped and that United States authorities helped kidnap the school teachers is completely untrue, this Government holds. The State Department implied that the charge was based on "misinformation" furnished his chiefs by Lomakin. If the Soviets want to make Lomakin the goat of the whole dispute this gives them a way out.

3. The American Government recognizes Russia's rights to protect its citizens but those citizens under American law have the right of free choice. At this point the note declared emphatically "the government of the United States cannot permit the exercise within the United States of the police power of any foreign government."

The United States had little to complain about in connection with Lomakin's handling of the Samarin case, since the man, his wife and their three children never fell into the hands of the Consul General. As soon as its note was released the State Department began to make propaganda capital of the facilities of the government.

Officials here refused to say what would happen if Lomakin decided to turn against the Soviet Government and ask to remain in the United States.
