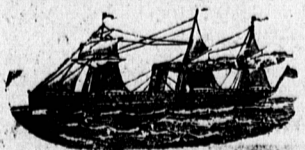

DON JAIME FOR PEACE.

VIENNA, Aug. 3.—Don Jaime, the pretender to the Spanish throne, declared in an interview here yesterday that he had no intention of interfering in the present crisis in Spain, and said that his retirement to Frobsdorf, in Lower Austria, far from the Spanish frontier, was proof of his peaceful purposes.

"The 'Tollit' party is a party of order," said Don Jaime. "I never will take upon myself to bring an entire people into danger for my own ends. Never will I lead Spaniards against Spaniards. Should I return to Spain at the head of an army it would be only to restore order. This might happen should the revolutionaries drive out King Alfonso, or to the welfare of the country require it. The popularity of King Alfonso is declining through no fault of his own, and Queen Victoria is certainly less liked than the King. Spaniards dread foreign influence. Victoria has remained a stranger too long, and she people will never forgive her." Don Jaime is of the opinion that the war in Morocco was unavoidable, and he fears that it will last a long time.

According to announcement the comedy drama, The Heart of Florida, was presented at the Opera House last evening. The proceeds of the performance and the repeat tonight are in aid of the Firemen's Fund, a most worthy and popular object. The play, as its name indicates is an exposition of southern life and sentiment, but variety is given by a change of scene from the home of a country gentleman in Florida to an artist's studio in New York and thence back to the old residence in the south. There was a good audience present when the curtain rose for the first scene. The stage was attractively adorned with tropical trees and plants. Vinnicombe's orchestra had been playing southern melodies, and when they ceased, voices behind the scenes were singing the sad sweet strains of the Swanee River. All of which was very pretty and effective as a prelude to the exposition of life in the south which was to follow. The play is an agreeable one, with just enough plot, a variety of domestic, sentimental and adventurous incidents and character portraiture to hold the attention and enough of humorous incident to cause a ripple of laughter from time to time. Miss Sadie Calhoun proved a winsome and engaging artist and the local members of the cast, under her direction had become thoroughly proficient in their several parts. These included Lewis H. Beer as Col. Garland, and with him W. J. Brown, Justin Mc Grath, A. W. Gaudet, Mr. Flaherty Ernest McInnis, Norton White and Misses. Ella J. Large, Bertha F. Gorman (who gave a stirring recitation between acts) Annie Egan, Rosie Ryan and Ida Doyle. Where all did so well it would be invidious to make distinctions. The play ran smoothly and was highly enjoyable from beginning to end. The company deserve and will doubtless be accorded another full house at the repeat performance this evening.

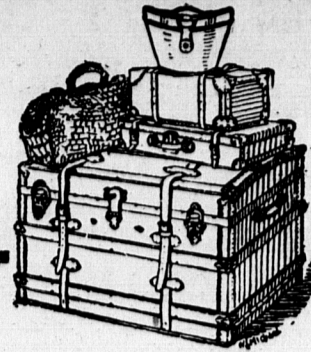
