## New Discovery In Wireless

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, July 10.—Another great step in the development of wireless telegraphic transmission has been realized. A new system of low cost transmission has been discovered which will put wireless communications ultimately within the reach of all.

Senator Marconi, has amplified the cabled statement concerning this new system by giving further details of the two months experimental cruise from which he and his staff have just returned.

### A Great Step

"The results have been very satisfactory," he said, "and they constitute a great progressive step in wireless telegraphy.

"We have transmitted messages up to a distance of 2,250 miles, not only with a very much smaller amount of power and energy, but faster and more cheaply than with the ordinary system of long distance wireless.

"There is a great increase in efficiency, and cost is much reduced. When this system is adopted it will mean that a power station for long distance work can be erected at a much less cost. I have telegraphed on this system from Cape Verde islands, off the African coast, to Marconi House, and I wanted to try from Brazil, but time prevented it.

### Far Less Power Needed

"To send this message clearly and more rapidly over those 3,250 miles took less power than a message from London to Paris by the ordinary methods. In fact, it was only a small fraction of the power required.

"It is done by the utilisation of waves that have not been used before, and the production of them efficiently. The production of these waves could not have been achieved at all twenty years ago when I started on wireless research of the science of wireless.

"That in itself is a great satisfaction to me. The fascinating thing about this science is that you never know where you are, in the sense that something fresh is likely to turn up in research which shows you how to do things better.

### In Its Infancy.

"That is why I say wireless is in its infancy, though, of course, finally will be eventually reached. We are a long way from that stage."

Senator Marconi declared: "That the long-distance wireless of the future would be sent from stations built at comparatively small cost.

"That, given the necessary mechanical elements, messages could be sent clearly at seven times the present rate, and

"That Press and public would ultimately have the benefit of much cheaper commercial charges.

"In regard to long-distance direct wireless, progress has also been made. Successful directive messages have been sent over a distance of 100 miles and it will soon be possible to send messages directly 'localised over longer distances.

Senator Marconi proposes to go on another experimental trip in a few weeks' time, and later to try the new system of long distance wireless from off the coast of America.

The commercial advantages from a cheaper and quicker system of wireless between the two hemispheres cannot be overestimated.

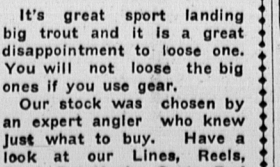

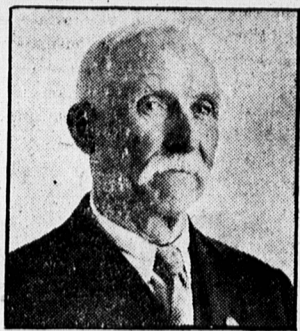

# FINE RECEPTION TO MESSRS MYERS AND BENTLEY

Opening of the Campaign in the Fourth District of Prince County.

The opening meeting of the campaign in the 4th District of Prince was held in the hall at Travellers Rest on Monday night, July 9th.

The chairman, Mr. Townsend called the meeting to order about 8 p. m. The Conservative candidates, Messrs. Myers and Bentley received a very cordial reception on entering the hall.

Premier Bell was the first speaker of the evening. He reiterated his usual story about being the first to give the women a vote, the vacant schools, and the deplorable condition of finances when they took office, the road policy of his government and his wonderful achievement of making revenue and expenditure meet, after collecting over \$200,000 additional taxes as well as borrowing \$300,000.

He was frequently interrupted by cries of "What about our muscle mud?" "Salary grab," etc. but managed to get through without serious interruption.

He was followed by Mr. Bentley who in a most maiden speech of about twenty minutes reviewed the legislation of the past four years, recalled the broken promises and high taxes of the Bell Government. He made a strong appeal to the electors, for their support in the interest of better government on the twenty-sixth, and the applause he received on resuming his seat testified to the popularity in this part of the country.

Mr. Lea who followed, attempted to justify the government's position. He had not got very far when several interruptions occurred. The chairman in vain called for order. When Mr. Lea proceeded he was again interrupted by the several sounds that appeared to come more from the animal world. A local magistrate at this point intervened and threatened the offenders with the law, which had a quieting effect. Speaking of the repeal of the poll tax, Mr. Lea endeavored to mislead the people by contending the Provincial poll tax. In face of the fact that the External Auditor shows an increase of debt from 1919 to 1922 of \$242,497.10. Mr. Lea made the astounding statement that they had reduced the debt by \$100,000. But the people evidently are not very much interested in Mr. Lea's "high finance", remembering rather that they have been laced white with taxes, a large part of which has found its way into Mr. Lea's own pocket.

Mr. Myers on rising to speak was given a hearty reception by the audience, and in a ringing speech ably reviewed the issues of the day. He showed that it was the Conservative government at Ottawa who first extended the franchise to the ladies, and severely criticized the Bell Government for not giving the ladies the full property vote. Reading from the report of the superintendent of Education for 1919, Mr. Myers showed that at the end of that year there were nine schools vacant instead of a hundred as stated by Mr. Bell. Speaking of the roads Mr. Myers plainly showed that the Conservative party was the friend of good roads, but what they objected to was the shameful way in which the money has been wasted, the most of it finding its way into the pockets of a few party favorites while the working man was only receiving \$2.00 per day and boarding himself. Mr. Myers ably reviewed the finances of the province and clearly put before the electors of policy of the Conservative party. On resuming his seat he received prolonged applause. At this stage of the meeting a Mr. Jenkins of Bedouque came to the platform and announced that he and another party would be Progressive candidates in the fourth district. He was followed by a few brief remarks by Mr. Horace Wright, Progressive candidate for second Prince. Mr. Wright confined his criticism largely to the present Liberal administration at Ottawa.

The trend of the meeting throughout, was strongly in favor of the Conservative candidates. At the close of the meeting a vote of thanks was tendered the chairman.
