LECTURE AT RUSTICO HALL.—On the 15th February, 1924, Rev. W. V. On the 5th September, 1755, Colonel Winslow, acting under instructions from Governor Lawrence of Halifax, summoned all the male inhabitants of Grand Pre and even boys of ten years of age, to the Church of St. Charles. He pretended to have a very important message from King George II. to communicate to them. They were made prisoners and were told that they were to be transported to the shores of the Atlantic. This announcement was carried out to the letter. After the fall of Louisbourg in 1758, the Acadians of the Island of St. John were treated in the same way by Lord Rona, by order of Admiral Boscawen. The Reverend lecturer urged upon his hearers, descendants of those who had been so cruelly treated, to show themselves worthy of their ancestors. Although they were to forgive past injustices and persecutions, they should nevertheless remember that their forefathers were always guided by principles of honor and duty.—One who was present.

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Orient Wants Canadian Products

(Canadian Press)

VICTORIA, B. C. Feb. 18.—The Orient is gradually adopting Western ways with the result that there will be an increasing demand for Canadian products within the next few days. Mr. A. H. Rasmussen, Shanghai business man, told the chamber of commerce here recently.

Very little timber exists in China, declared the speaker, and what there is of it is very small. Yet a vast amount of lumber is needed, as better buildings are growing in favor among the Chinese, who are learning to spend money liberally on the comforts of life. Some of the most palatial buildings in Shanghai, he stated, are now occupied by Chinese.

Canada should be able to market a tremendous amount of lumber across the Pacific.

Wheat, paper and fruit were other main products on which exporters in Canada could wisely concentrate.

The wheat market was developing surprisingly with the rising price of rice. The workers, comprising 80 per cent of China's 400,000,000 population are finding rice too high and turning to wheat. Wheat to some extent is grown in China, but the little produced is inferior. When millions of people were changing their diet in this manner, said Mr. Rasmussen, the trade possibilities were enormous. What was true of China held good for Japan as far as wheat is concerned.

Paper and cement should also find ready market in China. Norway and Sweden are at present shipping these commodities to the Orient, despite the tremendous distance that separates them from this market.

Of course, it was always necessary to bear in mind that active competition existed. China was developing rapidly. The fourteen miles of river between the sea and Shanghai, now being dredged and docked to form one great harbor, possessed modern cotton mills, some operated by Europeans and some by Chinese; an egg factory, ship yards and lumber yards the latter handling British Columbia timber.

The interior of China was a treasure house of gold and other minerals and the superstition that evil spirits dwell in the earth which has hitherto kept the Chinese from digging deep into the ground, is dying out.
