FIRE INSPECTOR TO BE APPOINTED

If the Fire Underwriters Reduce Rates

Other Questions Discussed at the City Council Last Night—More Electric Lights for the City.

The regular meeting of the City Council was held last night with a full board. After reading bills and minutes of last meeting Mayor Warburton called attention to the engravings of portraits of Lord and Lady Minto now hanging in the chamber. He read the letter of acknowledgment.

His Worship also reported that he had a visit from Messrs Hazard and McEachern of the Board of Fire Underwriters, several days ago and they had consented to withdraw the 25 cents recently imposed and waive the addition in January should a Fire Inspector be appointed.

Coun. Moore moved that an Inspector be appointed should the Board consent to do as they had agreed.

Coun. Wear raised the question as to whether the Inspector could inspect the works of the Light and Power Company. On the other hand the Inspector might condemn half the wiring in the city and then a howl would go up.

Coun. Hooper questioned as to whether the city would be responsible in case of accident. Coun. Moore read the Halifax regulations and Coun. Paton was glad an appointment was to be made.

Coun. Lyons recommended that action be deferred till next meeting and in the meantime that the council and the recorder consult as to the best agreement. Coun. Stewart did not think the council was committed to anything by passing the resolution before the Council.

Couns. Wear and Paton endorsed the suggestion of Coun Lyons that the matter be deferred. After further consideration Coun. Moore's resolution was carried and the Fire Board were appointed to confer with the recorder and report at next meeting.

In response to a request of the Board of Trade for a right of way for a railway along Lower Water a resolution was passed granting the request, Coun. Hooper dissenting.

Communications were presented asking for lights on the lane running between King and Water in the rear of the Owen building and on Clarke Street near Worth's livery. Both petitions were granted.

Coun Paton reported that Prince Street macadamizing would be finished this week. The committee had spent \$8,538.98 of the \$10,000. The next work proposed was on Esus on Street near the foundry and Great George below the Palace. This would all take in about \$11,000.

Coun Lyons made a strong plea for the work at Lower Great George at once. He moved a resolution to that effect. After remarks by Couns. Paton and Hooper the motion was carried unanimously.

Coun. Hooper asked for lights on Chestnut Street between Queen and Great George Street and on Easton near Queen. Carried.

Coun. Grant reported that Dorchester Street between St. George and Prince was in bad condition. Referred to Chairman Street Committee.

Coun Stewart referred to a bad place at Webster & McKay's Corner. Referred to Coun Paton who stated the matters were all under consideration.

Coun Lyons enclosed the work of Coun Paton on the streets and also the labor of the City Surveyor.

Council then adjourned.
