Huge Volume Of Mail Handled At Summerside

The volume of mail incoming and outgoing handled by the Summerside Post Office was one of the largest in history, an official here stated yesterday. The number of letters handled that day was over thirty thousand with hundreds of parcels to be taken care of as well. In order to handle this enormous mail five extra clerks were added to the staff and officials stated that more clerks could have been used due to lack of office space there was no room to work, even with the augmented staff.

Street delivery teams were delivering parcels from the time they arrived, which proved a life saver both in improved service to the public and in keeping the parcels from accumulating to too great an extent. In view of the yearly increase in the volume of mail handled in Summerside the lack of space in the Post Office is becoming more and more a problem. The number of parcels this year could not have been handled had the officials not resorted to team delivery and both Mr. Allan and his assistant Mr. Peters as well as the entire staff are to be highly commended for the manner in which they continue to serve the public each year under existing conditions.

Native Of Poland Is Admitted To Canadian Citizenship

Mr. Adrian Dekker, a native of Poland and now residing in Bedouque, was admitted to Canadian citizenship at the opening of the fall term of the County Court in Summerside yesterday. He was presented with a certificate of citizenship and took the oath of allegiance, also the oath of renunciation of former nationality. The statutory charge was read to him by Judge L.G. Lewis, who presided at the court.

After the oath had been administered Judge Lewis spoke to him as follows:

"I wish to take this opportunity of congratulating you personally on the attainment of Canadian citizenship. By this certificate of citizenship you have been granted the rights and privileges of a citizen of Canada. These rights and privileges entitle you to freedom of speech, religion, thought, action, the right to vote as you choose and the right to be secure in your possessions. Your citizenship carries the obligation of defending your adopted country in time of need, of living in peaceful brotherhood with your fellow Canadians and of doing your part in the preservation of Canadian ideals and institutions. I extend to you a warm welcome on this solemn occasion and I invite you to share with us the ancient liberties of a free people, living together in harmony under a democratic government, which recognizes the rights of all its citizens."—S.

DRIFTWOOD

Sentence In Gallant Liquor Case In S'side

Following is the concluding part of the judgment in the John (Holman) Gallant case delivered by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell in the Supreme Court at Summerside. The costs referred to were set at \$377.75 yesterday morning. "As to sentence, in the altogether unusual circumstances of the present case, where convictions are sustained only by the court's revival of a state of law which the Crown had disavowed over three years, I do not consider that the Crown can properly be treated as a basis for increased penalties on the present charges. The relationship of 'previous' and 'subsequent' convictions implies a continuity in the state of the law which has been violated. "Although, in the opinion which I have reached, the Cullen Amendment did not make any technical change in the existing law, its administrative adoption by the Crown would create a practical hiatus. Each of the appellant's offences will therefore be treated as a first, and, in view of the small quantities of liquor involved, the Court adjudges that the sentence in each case be reduced to a fine of \$200, and costs in the Magistrate's Court amounting to \$20 and \$4.50 respectively; and in default of immediate payment of fine and costs imprisonment in each case consecutively in Prince County Jail for a period of three months.

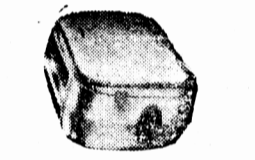

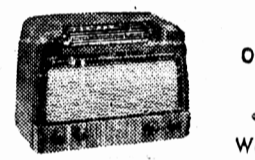

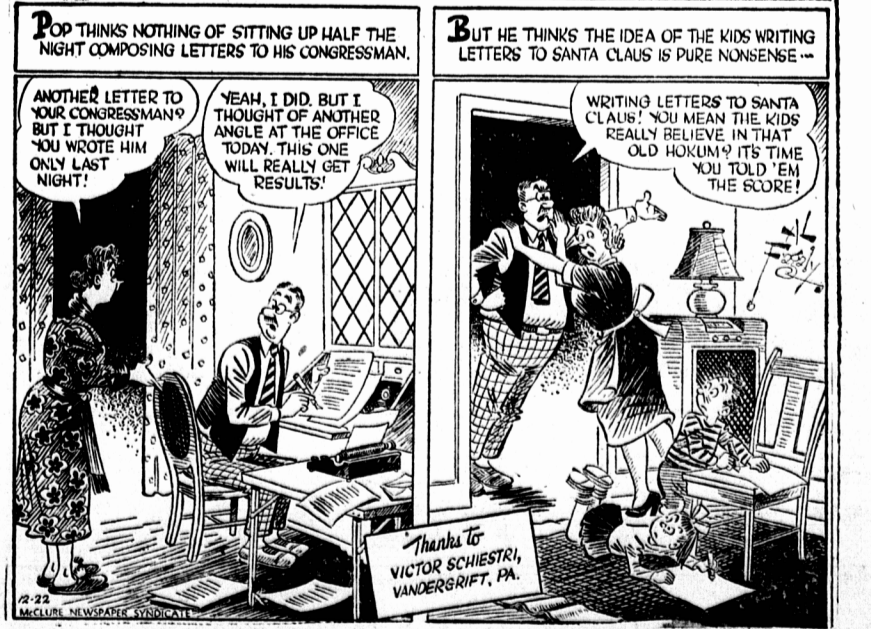
