ST. DUNSTAN'S DEFEATED MT. ALLISON 9-0

Much Interest Shown in Intercollegiate Football Contest Yesterday. Some Good Plays Made.

The Abegweit grounds took on the appearance of other days yesterday afternoon when the football teams of St. Dunstan's and Mount Allison Universities lined up against each other in battle array.

Although the weather was uncomfortably cool with a strong northerly breeze sweeping across the camp, there was a very good turnout of spectators. The game resulted in a victory for St. Dunstan's the score being 9-0 in their favor.

It was quite an interesting contest and no doubt a great deal of previous football has been seen here in better years but none in which better playing prevailed between the players. As it was the first match of the season for Mount Allison and only the second for St. Dunstan's it was taken all through not a bad exposition of the game and was marked at several stages by brilliant play.

St. Dunstan's proved the superior team, both in weight and attack. The fact that the play was in Mount Allison territory practically throughout the entire course of the game was sufficient in itself to prove this.

The ball was set in motion by St. Dunstan's taking the kick-off against the wind. A series of scrums followed. St. Dunstan's holding the visitors down hard in Mt. A. territory. Finally from an intercepted pass L. McDonald of St. Dunstan's succeeded in getting hold of the ball and he did so successfully over the line amid the plaudits of the crowd. The attempt to convert failed.

Soon after the Saints again scored, Sullivan from a run on the wing doing the trick this time.

The second half was played with all the conditions favorable to the visitors, the wind being with them and the form of play—the one man scrum—their own—being used.

Callaghan made a brilliant exploit when he gathered in the pigskin and sailed half the length of the field with it to within a few feet of the coveted touch-line, where he was

brought to earth. Mount Allison gained a free kick shortly after which removed them temporarily from the danger zone. Good runs followed from S. McDonald, P. McQuaid, P. Sullivan and P. McLellan for St. Dunstan's.

McAfee of the Mt. A. quarter line and captain of the team also made a dandy run, and splendid runs followed by West and Pickles and some of their forwards.

Some scrums around centre, and a free kick for Mt. A. were followed in short order by another tally for St. Dunstan's, Sullivan going over in the best run of the day from a neat pass from Callaghan.

This made the score 9 to 0 in the local team's favor none of the attempts to convert succeeding. This ended the game and cheers were exchanged by victors and vanquished.

ALBUQUERQUE, New Mexico Oct. 22.—Albert, King of the Belgians, Queen Elizabeth, and their son, Leopold, were travelling through Kansas yesterday on their way eastward. Two stops were scheduled for the day, the first at Emporia, Kansas, and the second at Kansas City, Missouri, where the royal special was due at midnight.

The King on Sunday exchanged greetings at Gallup, New Mexico, with Chief Shagotic, tribal judge of the Navajo Indians, witnessed a war dance and worshipped at the Indian church at Isleta, built three centuries ago. Queen Elizabeth took pictures of the Indian squaws who had gathered at the little village to meet them.

It seems hard to realize that our Beloved Minister—that dear servant of God will never more go in and out among us and break unto us the bread of life. Many hearts are saddened and our eyes are still with tears for his loss, for although we shall sorely miss him we know that he has gone home to happiness. He hath entered into that rest prepared for the people of God where the wicked cease from troubling, and where the weary are forever at rest. With the warmth of his friendship, his kindness and tender sympathy, his faithfulness, his genuine Christian charity and zeal for the salvation of souls will never be surpassed. Only those whom he hath been a comfort to in times of sickness and affliction could fully appreciate the true worth of his Lord and Master and may we ever remember all the solemn warnings and the loving Godly counsel we have received from those blessed lips that are now cold and still in death. No one enjoyed innocent pleasure more fondly than he and was never more ashamed to publicly denounce what he considered in opposition to the advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom and to the uplift of humanity. Nelson Day at Prince St. School

The Nelson Day exercises at Prince Street School were largely attended by parents and friends on Wednesday afternoon and were ably presided over by Mr. Henry Smith, chairman of the School Board, who complimented Principal Seaman, the teachers and public on the fine entertainment of songs, choruses and recitations provided.

Addresses, all complimentary to the fine work done in Prince Street School were given by Rev. G. C. Taylor, Rev. H. Raymond, Rev. Dr. F. J. Hyndman.

Premier Bell was also present and gave an interesting talk dealing with the Battle of the Nile and also described a visit which he had made to Aboukir Bay, some years ago. At the conclusion of the Premier's remarks, Mayor Wright spoke acknowledging the address presented to him by the pupils, thanking him for the gift of beautiful pictures of the Nile and the Nile valley, which he had given to the school. His words of praise referred to the educative value of pictures and complimented the children on the admirable manner in which they had rendered their exercises. He very kindly promised to offer a similar gift next year.

Your Worship:—Our meeting in this hall today is made especially pleasant, because of the beautiful pictures which adorn our walls, the generous gift of yourself.

We look at the front walls and see the portraits of our beloved King and Queen; upon the south wall are two beautiful landscapes by Breauxski; also two pictures by Baudouin. These are not only decorative but are educative also.

Future generations of pupils as well as ourselves will profit by having ever before them these beautiful pictures. Their artistic taste as well as ours will be cultivated.

Kindly accept from us on behalf of the teachers of the school and our fellow pupils, our sincerest thanks for your magnificent gift of pictures, for your magnificence, Mildred Tombs, Marjorie Long.

Another pleasing feature of the proceedings was the presentation of a prize donated by Mr. James Paton to Miss Lena McLure, for the best essay on "How I spent my holidays." Mr. Paton in a few well-chosen remarks spoke of the pleasure it gave him to encourage the children.

Mr. J. O. Hyndman, Secretary of the local branch of the Navy League, in a capital address outlined the work of the league and then referred to the present agitation of the teachers of the Province expressing sympathy in their demand and hoped they would stand firm.
