Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any other person who may have a homesteaded section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not at Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within a mile of the homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homesteaded right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 10 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

mindful that it is one of our first duties to practise strict economy. For, as a noted writer says, "Economy may be styled the daughter of prudence, the sister of temperance, and the mother of liberty." At the present day the Mother country has need of money for many things. She has to pay and keep her soldiers, get supplies of tonnage, air-ships, ammunition, war-ships, and keep war far from the door depending on her. It is certainly the duty of the colonies to help England in her big difficulties. The colonies have many national resources wherein money can be obtained. But it takes time and men to turn these into gold. Therefore, the people must practise thrift in order to be able to lend ready money to the Dominion. The lenders have ample security in the natural resources of the country, and will receive a comparatively greater and decidedly more extensively advertised. Another reason for practising thrift is the fact that after this dreadful war has ceased its frightful destruction, the necessities of life will be very expensive. Hence, to ward off starvation and to prevent an undue drain on society through the poverty of the poorer classes the strictest economy should be practised.

Some people perhaps, already realize the necessity for thrift, but do not quite know how to set about it. But in this matter, as in so many others, a small beginning should not be despised. By strict attention to details thousands of poor men have become rich. They are said to be wonderfully "lucky," whereas, in reality, they have simply been prudent and thrifty. One will be surprised to find how easy it is to save when it has once been begun. The plan of cultivating all the vacant lots is, indeed, a very good way of practising thrift, as also that of raising more live stock and poultry. In some of the provinces, prizes are offered for the man who has the most land under cultivation. Various home products, such as the raising of vegetables, the culture of bees, the raising of poultry, and so many other industries which would be the only amusement for the ordinary boy, and the confection of laces, millinery requirements, and many other branches of art needlework for the girls, should receive the greatest encouragement on the part of the parents and teachers, as they are all means of cutting down household expenditure. Girls should learn to cut, make and take care of their own clothing. Housewives should endeavor to practise economy in all details of the household work. The thrifty housewife can save much in the matter of food.

A cheap meal is not always a poor one. Everyone ought to have a sufficient amount of wholesome food, but that is no reason why poor people should buy the dearest.

When potatoes are so high, people can be taught to avoid waste in peeling, and to improvise new dishes

from what remains over from the previous meal. Some states have set us good example of thrift by turning refuse matter into fuel which sells at half the price of coal. If people went to bed earlier much coal and light could be saved, not to speak of the rain to their physical health. Cleanliness in the person and home is also a kind of thrift. It is fully recognized that a great amount of sickness is the direct or indirect result of unclean or unhealthy homes. One should also be thrifty and punctual in the matter of time. Many a person has lost the opportunity of bettering himself and died in poverty after grumbling all through his later life that he never had had a chance. Lord Nelson attributed much of his success to the fact that he was always ready a quarter of an hour before it was absolutely necessary. Even in amusements thrift can be practised. If one should get a good book from the Public Library and read it instead of attending foreign plays which come here he would not only be saving the money for himself, but he would also be keeping it in Canada.

In luxuries and style also, thrift should be practised. If men gave up smoking tobacco and cigars, much money would be saved, and the statesmen would have much better health. Some people belong to expensive clubs where they have to pay enormous fees each year, and where the poorer members spend most of their money trying to live up to the style of the wealthier ones. This is certainly unthrifty.

If alcohol were not imported into the country, many of its victims, making a virtue of necessity, would have a chance to rise from the mire and take their place as men in the councils of their country. Many boys can clothe themselves and save money besides, with their proceeds from selling newspapers, carrying parcels, driving teams and doing various household chores. During vacation, when farmers have so much need of help, even city boys could earn a considerable amount of money by hiring out for farm work. The parents always practise to it, however, that their children's associates are persons of good moral character.

Even the school children may have their share in the thrift campaign, by avoiding waste in the matter of paper, pencils and other school requisites, and abstaining from sweets and other useless expense.

As finance plays an important, if not a decisive part in every great struggle, we must see to it that the resources of Great Britain not only equal, but surpass those of the enemy. This being accomplished only by means of national thrift, we see that victory will be the first fruit of our sacrifice. The gain to Canada and our positions will be of no less importance, as each individual being prepared to resist the strain of taxation and the high cost of living, will not only be self-supporting, but will be in a position to contribute to the

GERMAN ATTACKS ARE REPULSED

(Canadian Press Despatch)
PARIS—Further progress was made by the French in Champagne front during the night. Two German counter-attacks were repulsed and 129 prisoners according to the official statement follows:

"On the Chemin Des Dames, the enemy's artillery, vigorously counter-attacked by ours, showed great activity from a point north of Jouy as far as the region to the east and west of Cerny brought no result. All our positions were maintained."

"We enlarged appreciably late yesterday our positions on both sides of Montcaumon, in the Champagne. In this attack, we took 120 prisoners, of whom two are officers."

Another great effect of thrift will be on the moral tone of society; for if the old adage be true that, "Idleness is the mother of vice," then its contrary, Industry, will surely engender virtue. 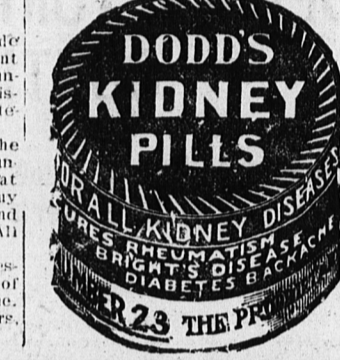
