Super-race of Men Live to be 150

LONDON, June 29.—Dr. Serge Voronoff, the "monkey-land" rejuvenator, has hit upon a new theory.

He believes that by adding a third gland to strong, healthy, intelligent and promising young boys he can create a race of supermen who will live to be 150 years old. He has had wonderful results from adding a third gland to young rats, and is now trying a similar experiment on an eight-year-old boy, and thinks that even the first generation of the boy's descendants will show exceptional qualities.

"I look into the future and clearly see the possibility of a race of supermen," Dr. Voronoff said. "It is all very well grafting glands from monkey on to aged human beings. That sets the clock back.
