THE PACE.

ling all day, in the hope of solving a difficulty or of warding off an impending loss, perhaps bankruptcy. He associates with companions and in the midst of the recreation he feels secretly desolate because the one tyrannical topic will persist in running round in his mind, like a clock-work mouse, without accomplishing any useful end and making impossible any genuine participation in the gaiety that surrounds him.

Instead of being necessary to the success of his business this morbid preoccupation is positively detrimental to his business. He would think more usefully, more powerfully, more creatively about his business if during at least half of the twenty-four hours he never thought of it all.

Is there a remedy for this? Must men pay with their lives and sacrifice the comfort of those in their homes, for the privilege of earning a living? An authority, who has probably never been in the procession, claims that the "obsession" can be overcome if the afflicted one "deliberately tries to think of something else, or to think of nothing at all—every time he catches himself in the act of thinking about his business out of hours. By following up this "endeavor" patiently and persistently, there is a hope that, in the end, or more correctly, immediately before the end, he may be cured.

Doubtless much can be done by patient effort and self-schooling. There are those who can deliberately and effectively close their doors upon their business when business hours are over. They are the fortunate ones and their example is well worth imitating.

Our "theory" will not have "fallen to pieces" until the people who know carry their information to the prosecutor and, he failing, to the Attorney General, nor even then until the Attorney General has given his explanation, which explanation we would cheerfully demand.

We are quoted as saying "that the Attorney General threw all the blame on the prosecutor." We think what we said was "threw all the responsibility on the prosecutor."

We think, with our correspondent, that "it is up to the Attorney General," if he knows. If he does not know it is up to the people who know to let him know.
