TO REPAIR AULD BRIG OF AYR

LONDON, March 21.—R. A. Oswald, is to convene a public meeting in Ayr, when resolutions will be submitted and a committee appointed to obtain subscriptions for executing the works necessary for the preservation of the Auld Brig. Should the committee, not later than August 1st, raise the funds, estimated at £10,000, the Town Council will allow the committee to carry out the necessary preservation works on the bridge. The whole work is to be finished by August 1, 1907, if the funds are raised.

BOER'S POLICY IS MODERATION

PRETORIA, S. A., Mar. 21.—At a meeting held here, General Botha said that the cancellation of the letters patent had relieved the Transvaal of being ruled by the chamber of mines and Messrs. Werner, Beit. He bitterly assailed Lord Milner. His administration, General Botha said, had brought the population to greater poverty and distress than ever before. Today, the Transvaalers possessed nothing, but he thanked God that there was a government in England which, he hoped, would see justice done. A little clique would no longer be allowed to dominate South Africa. The mine owners and the Chinese would both be kicked out if outrages continued, but every industry must be supported, and receive as much labor as possible. Who-ever imported labor must properly control it. General Botha, in conclusion, counseled the Boers to go on quietly as they had done since the war, and strive to create a moderate party, of Boers and Britons, which would abolish the present injustices. A resolution expressing gratitude to the imperial government was passed with acclamation.
