HAWAIIAN MISSION.—Dr. Wadman, a native of Crapaud, P. E. I., who has been superintendent of Methodist missions in Hawaii for ten years, said in his final report of the Hawaiian work: "Ten years ago we reported a membership of 216. Today the statistical report shows a total of 1,795. We began with four church buildings, valued at \$15,000. Today we have thirty-one, valued at \$122,460. In 1904 there were six Sunday schools with an enrollment of 364 pupils. At present there are thirty-nine schools and a total attendance of 1,642 scholars. Ten years ago there were twenty-eight Epworth Leaguers in our different churches. This year's statistics indicate 508. When the mission was organized, we had no day schools and only a few night classes. There are now several of the former, including the Korean boarding school of Honolulu, with its 120 students enrolled and evening classes in nearly all our churches, making a total student body of 500 in round numbers."

BOYS' WORK MOVEMENT.—Twenty-three boys gathered in the hall on Union Road on Saturday evening for an excellent banquet, which was served by the ladies of the place. The affair marked the inauguration of the Boys' Work Movement in that section of the province. It was regretted that many of the boys from the outlying points in the district, were not present. The boys are enthusiastic in their desire to carry out the activities which are proving so popular in other places, especially baseball and the organized boys' class in the Sunday school. The Union Road baseball team is being organized. As soon as teams are organized at York and Brackley Point Road a league will be formed to play a series of games. Mr. Wesley Steele, the Rural Boys' Work secretary, was present at the banquet and conducted an after supper conference in which the boys were made acquainted with the plan and spirit of the movement. Among the boys who spoke were Bruce Yeo, Harold Prowse, Wilbur Robinson and Harold Watts, also Mr. Robinson, Superintendent of Harrington Sunday School and Rev. E. A. Westmorland. Bruce Yeo and Archie Mellett were elected president and secretary, respectively, of both the district and the Union Road Boys' Sunday school class, in which all the activities will centre. The evening of good fellowship was preceded by a series of athletic sports, which included a base ball game and events along the line of athletic work in the Standard Em-

S. S. HALIFAX.—The Plant Line steamer Halifax Capt. Hawes, arrived in Charlottetown at six o'clock yesterday morning on her first trip this season to this port, after an uneventful passage from Boston. There came by her eight passengers, Messrs A. Matheson, N. Hamel, Neil McInnis, W. E. Tobin and A. M. Wall, and Misses V. McInnis, E. McInnis and Mrs. Maddox. The Halifax sailed at noon yesterday with a small cargo and two passengers, Messrs B. G. Burill and J. Nicholson, both booked for Halifax. The following are the ship's crew: Chief Officer Walker Second Officer McLeod, Third Officer Perry, Chief Steward P. J. Laford, Second Steward J. Myers, Chief Engineer Dobie, Miss Sutherland, Steward-ess.

IMPROVEMENTS.—Carpenters are busy at the Victoria Hotel to which certain improvements that will add effectively to the appearance of the building are being carried out. The ceiling of the office is being re-papered with a pattern of an excellent design, bright and attractive; while the roof is to be raised for the accommodation of another flat. With this additional flat there will be altogether five stories, and the management have considered it necessary to install an elevator. For this purpose a motor will be added to the power house at the back of the Hotel. In the result the Victoria Hotel will be a most imposing building and will undoubtedly be a landmark in the city. The carpenters will have the work completed by July 15, so that the Hotel will be ready for visitors to Charlottetown on the occasion of the Confederation celebration. For the time being the usual entrance in Water street and the side entrance are both closed, the entrance to the temporary office being the door east of the Water street entrance. The office proper and smoking room are at present occupied by a scaffold on which the paper hangings are at work.

SHEEP-BREEDERS' LAWS.—The by-laws of the Sheep Breeders Association have been prepared by the Executive and approved of by the Governor in Council. The most important portion of them, so far as the ordinary farmer is concerned, has reference to the insurance of sheep against destruction by dogs. There are to be two classes of insurance—one for pure-bred registered sheep and the other for sheep not registered. Insurance in the first class is 3 cents per sheep and the compensatory for loss shall not exceed \$15. For ordinary sheep, or those which have not been registered, the insurance is one cent per head and the compensation shall not exceed \$6. The Secretary-Treasurer of the Association is the Secretary of Agriculture, and he will be prepared to accept in insurance fees, within the next three weeks. The Constitution and By-laws is in the hands of the printer and will be distributed as soon as ready. Members of the Association are expected to send in the correct number of sheep owned by their membership fees, and they are also expected to exercise due diligence to protect their sheep from dogs. In the case of a sheep being killed, they must endeavour to find the owner of the dog or dogs responsible for the damage. If damage cannot be collected from the owner of the dog, the Association will make good the loss. Every claim, however, shall be finally decided by the President of the Association, the Vice-President for the County in which the claim shall arise, and the Secretary. It is the general opinion that this Association will meet a long-felt want.
