munist is a workable system but only at the expense of the two forms of government. Even in the freest economy, capitalism does not exist in the purest, unadulterated form nor does Communism, he said. The best course to follow in regard to expressions of opinion about Russia is to say, "We like our Russian Allies with their communism and hope it will make them happy though it would not make us happy."

The speaker went on to say that Russian Imperialism was one of the causes of the first Great War and many now predict that the Soviets will try to revive this imperialism. He then gave a clear picture of the Russian situation within Russia with their political complexities.

Dr. Klein confessed that he had some apprehension as to the final outcome if Russia succeeds in winning the war without great assistance from the democracies. Workers and others might begin to worship that form of government, but if the democracies show their power then this government would be greatly boosted.

Concluding his address, the noted journalist made passing reference to France. He pointed to the fact that this nation had refused to surrender its navy to Germany; also only a token force had defended Madagascar when the British went there. The Allies "thank God" are now at Algiers and Morocco he said in approval of the latest Allied strategy.

When he had concluded his address, Dr. Klein was asked several questions by the audience. One of his questioners, Mr. V. A. Ainsworth wanted to know if Austrians were Nazi. By citing several anecdotes he dispelled any doubt on this score, but pointed out that there were in all probability, a few Nazis numbered among the Austrians. The picture was a little different in respect to Hungary he said in answer to a query from Mr. James E. Harris. However, there were still many anti-Nazis in that country. To Mr. Stuart Dixon, he answered that there would have to be a different order set up following this war from that instituted in 1919.

Prof. J. H. Blanchard spoke briefly toward the close of the meeting commenting on the fine lecture given by Dr. Klein. He moved a vote of thanks which was responded to by the entire audience rising in approval.
