THE GOLD YIELD

Gold received at the Perth branch of the Royal Mint in April totalled 53,054 ounces, valued at 473,450 pounds in Australian currency, which was 1,700 ounces less than the receipts in April last year.

RICHES IN GOLD

Excluding the period when the gold mines were idle for six weeks, the Lake View and Star Ltd., at Boulder has recovered gold each month from last July valued at 104,000 pounds (Australian) to 118,455 pounds, and its monthly profit has ranged from 38,798 pounds to 53,964 pounds.

At Nannine, north of Dey Dawn, Jack Boyce recovered 150 ounces of gold (worth 1,320 pounds) from specimen stone in a quartz reef, and 15 tons of other stone, treated at the State battery averaged 2 ounces a ton. Four pounds of specimen stone contained 25 ounces of gold.

At Bogardie, south of Dey Dawn, a prospector got 50 3-4 ounces of gold (worth 446 pounds) from 12 cwt. of ore, and another man recovered 82 ounces (worth 721 pounds) from 1 cwt.

STATE FINANCES

The general improvement in the State finances was maintained in April, with a surplus of 72,626 pounds, an increase of 9,128 pounds on that for April of last year. For the 10 months of the financial year there was a deficit of 193,289 pounds compared with a deficit of 787,236 pounds for the corresponding period of the previous year.

MINING AT DEEP LEVELS

Some of the mines on the Golden Mile at Kalbarri are being worked to a depth of 3000 ft. Plans for mining at 5000 ft. Professor Donald H. McLaughlin, professor of mining geology at Harvard University, who recently left Western Australia for South Africa, said that Canada and Western Australia seemed so much alike in their gold-bearing deposits that he could not help thinking that, as Canada was mining successfully down to 5000 ft., there was a future for West Australian mines at depths. The very large number of old small mines with proved ore deposits suggest that gold mining in Western Australia had a big future. If there were so many mines whose deposits apparently terminated at shallow depths, it seemed possible that, if sinking were continued through the lean and barren areas, gold would be found at depth.

HARVEY RIVER DEVIANION

After about four years' work, the State Government has nearly completed the deviation of the Harvey River, from Harvey about 14 miles westward into the ocean. Harvey is about 75 miles south of Perth, and at present, the river runs north-west from the town into Peel In-

FISHERMEN'S SILVER CUP WON LOCALLY—Yesterday a representative of the Guardian was shown a magnificent silver trophy won by Mr. Bruce Judson and Mr. Ernest McCabe, Alexandria, at the recent Pictou Carnival, and awarded to the competitors who travelled the farthest to take part in the race. ON TRIP AROUND THE WORLD—Visiting in San Francisco and Oakland this month are Mr. and Mrs. Temple Bourke of Honolulu. This is the first stop of the travel on an extended trip around the world. On June 8, Mr. and Mrs. Bourke will sail for New York by way of the Panama Canal. They will, about 30 miles away. In its course it floods a lot of the country in the winter, leaving swamps which render the land almost useless. FRUIT EXPORT TRADE

West Australian apple-growers have removed the cause of complaint, almost every season, about the immaturity of apples arriving in England from Australia on the first boats. A committee, comprising an apple grower from each of the main districts, members of the Fruit Shippers' Committee, and the Government Superintendent of Horticulture (Mr. G. W. Wickens), fixed early this year the earliest dates for the overseas export of the main varieties of apples. The following dates were rigidly adhered to:—Jonathans, Gloopapas and Dunns, March 7; Granny Smiths, March 25; Rome Beauty, April 15; Rokewood, Yates, and Doherty, April 30. A report from the Agent-General (Sir Hal Colebatch) stated that the West Australian first shipments were a decided improvement on the earlier shipments of apples. Since 1915 the State's exports of apples have increased from 60,737 to 618,234 cases in 1934, and of all fruit from 71,470 to 702,795 cases. In that period the export of pears has jumped from 3332 to 33,788 cases; grapes, from 691 to 46,307; and oranges, from 223 to 3860. Pineapples and peaches are going in smaller quantities.

BANK CLEARANCES

Trade so far this year continues to show an improvement on that for the corresponding period of 1934. Bank clearances to May 13 totalled 24,655,099 pounds, an increase of 1,378,673

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QUEENSLAND GOLD YIELD

According to figures made available by the Mines Department, 11,556 fine oz. of gold were won in Queensland during April. The yield for the corresponding month of last year was 8,875 fine oz. For the four months ended April 30, 41,090 fine oz. were won. For the same period last year the production was 33,562 fine oz.

LOW PRICES RETARD QUEENSLAND COTTON GROWING

A Japanese business delegation which has been visiting Australia has intimated that in Japan there exists a potential market of considerable capacity for Australian cotton. It has been ascertained, however, that the Commonwealth Government is not likely to take any steps to develop the market as the price which cotton would yield in Japan at world parity is below the Australian cost of production. The Government's policy for the assistance of raw cotton production is to limit production to approximately Australian requirements.

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ANGLO-AUSTRALIAN AIR MAIL DUPLICATION

As a result of rumors regarding the duplication of the Australia-England air mail at an early date, Mr. Hudson Fysh, managing director of Qantas Empire Airways, recently stated that his company was ready to duplicate the Brisbane-Singapore section of the service at very short notice, and he added that he considered that the duplication was vitally necessary owing to the heavy loads of mails, passengers and freight which were coming forward.

BRISBANE WOOL SALES AND JAPAN

Firm values, a buoyant tone and an eager demand marked the close of the 9th, 10th and 11th series of Brisbane wool sales which concluded in May. During the three weeks selling, approximately 2,170,000 pounds was realised. It is expected that the price given for greasy wool during the last week of the sales will average 1 shilling per lb. and 15 pounds, 10 shillings a bale, the highest price of the season.

LONDON, July 18.—Girls today have a much more clearly defined attitude towards marriage than the girls of our generation, said Miss G. Morgan, headmistress of Colston's Girls' School, Bristol, addressing the annual conference of the Association of Headmistresses at Cambridge.

\$75,000 IS RECEIVED ON ACCOUNT UNDER THE WHITE AWARD

Another \$75,000 Payment Due This Year

A cheque for \$75,000 has been received from Ottawa by the MacMillan Government as payment on account under the award of the White Commission. This represents ONE-HALF of the amount which the Province will receive this year under the award, which resulted in the placing of \$3,000,000 to our credit at Ottawa, through representations made in co-operation with the other Maritime Provinces by the MacMillan Government.

Coupled with the increases received under the Mathieson and Stewart Governments of \$100,000 and \$125,000 respectively, this represents A CAPITAL AMOUNT OF \$7,500,000, OR AN ANNUAL SUBSIDY INCREASE OF \$3,750,000, obtained by Conservatives after Laurier, in 1907, had "bolted the door" against further claims settlement.

A MILLION ADDITIONAL REVENUE

But the White Commission award by no means represents all that the MacMillan Government achieved in the matter obtaining Dominion revenue. Here are additional amounts, obtained during their term of office from the Bennett Government:
