I. C. R. BOOKLETS AS I.O.O.F. SOUVENIRS.  
A Feature of Recent Convention at Indianapolis.  
At the recent session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of I.O.O.F., held at Indianapolis, Indiana, and attended by delegates representing practically every Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows in Canada and the United States, the representatives from the Maritime Provinces used as a souvenir gift to other visiting delegates, a set of the publications of the Intercolonial Railway.
