American Soldiers and Spanish.

Writing to the New York Observer of last week from San Juan, the Rev. J. Milton Green, D. D., a Presbyterian divine, laments that, as far as his observa-

tions go, no organized effort has yet been made to give the Porto Ricans the pure gospel. The reason for that failure of the Protestant preachers in the island, he says, is because the American officers and soldiers demand all the time and work the preachers can bestow upon them, and adds Dr. Green:

"That they need it badly is evident on every hand. The exclusiveness and haughtiness of those who wear the gilded bars, and the immorality and abuses of the soldiers, have greatly added to the difficulty of winning a favorable hearing from the natives. Such pride of position and abuse of power are thoroughly alien to true Americanism."
