The Eastern Canada potato marketing board has taken its first official step to eliminate potatoes at a loss. Minimum prices which consumers must pay for potatoes "to permit of prices to the farmer in line for what potatoes should be sold to pay the farmer for his labor."

IN MEMORIAM

ADOLPHUS BRENNAN

Passed peacefully away at his home, 24 Longwood Ave., Charlottetown, on Sunday, Feb. 17th, Adolphus Brennan, in his fifty-second year, after a lengthy and protracted illness. Deceased was a son of the late Capt. James Brennan, of Souris, and at an early age entered the service of the C. N. Railway. Being a willing and industrious worker, his promotion was rapid, and when ill health forced him to retire some few years ago, he was regarded as one of the most efficient locomotive engineers of the Island Division.

During his illness he was frequently visited by the priests of the Basilica Staff and received the last rites of the Catholic Church, of which he had always been a devout member.

He leaves to mourn, a sorrowing widow and two sons, Frank and Billie, both pupils of Queen Square School. Also one sister, Miss Bessie Brennan, of Boston, Mass., who arrived home for the funeral, and one brother, J. W. Brennan, of Souris.

On Wednesday afternoon, the remains were conveyed to the Railway Depot for furtherance to Souris. The pall bearers were: John Leighton, Alfred Egan, Richard Douran, Arthur Howatt, John MacIsaac, and Geo. McCormack. The remains were accompanied by the members of the family, together with Miss Bessie Brennan and Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Brennan.

The funeral took place on Thursday morning from the residence of J. W. Brennan to St. Mary's Church, Souris, and was largely attended. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. I. R. A. McDonald, P.P., the service at the grave being conducted by Rev. Leonard MacDonald. The pall bearers were: A. C. Cox, John R. MacIsaac, J. Benj. MacPhee, Angus Lavie and Leonard McCormack.

Deceased possessed a most cheerful disposition, and had a host of friends and the many Mass Cards, Floral Tributes and Messages of Sympathy testified to the esteem in which he was held, not only at Borden, where he was formerly resided, but throughout Charlottetown and other sections of the community.

At Victoria Cross, P. E. I., there is in the person of Mr. Gavin D. Reid, a man of whom his friends, neighbors, and in fact, all Islanders may be proud.

Mr. Reid is the possessor of five magnificent, silver cups which are emblematic of the supremacy of two of his beautiful Ayrshire cows in competition with registered Ayrshires in the whole Dominion.

In 1927 Mr. Reid purchased an Ayrshire heifer bred by his brother Mr. Edward Reid, Rollo Bay, P. E. I., and registered under the name of Sunny Slope Bunny Jean. The following year this cow won, for her owner, the silver cup significant of having made the highest number of points of all Ayrshires in an official test in Canada. This was in the 365 day division in the three year old class.

In 1932, Winesport Betty, a daughter of Sunny Slope Bunny Jean, won by Mr. Reid by whom she was bred, the cup emblematic of her superiority over all four year old Ayrshire cows on official test in Canada.

In 1933, Winesport Betty repeated her performance of the previous year.

In 1934, Sunny Slope Bunny Jean again made herself and her master conspicuous by winning two cups, one of which was for the best record in mature class and the second for best record on two milkings a day. Both these cups were won in the honor roll division and in each contest Winesport Betty came second to her mother.

This achievement is particularly worthy of commendation when we consider the short period of time which Mr. Reid has devoted to this particular branch of farming.

Mr. Reid states that his successes although they give him a great deal of satisfaction, do not in the slightest degree preclude a desire to rest on the oars, instead to accomplish even greater things in the dairy world.

However, it must not be assumed that Mr. Reid is a dairy farmer in the usually accepted sense of the word. On the contrary his avocation is mixed farming. He says "it is fine to be a good cattleman, but the Island farmer of average wealth cannot expect lasting success, unless he understands how to farm his land properly."

Mr. Reid's success should act as an incentive to other young farmers, and they should remember that there is always room at the top. After all, a successful farmer is monarch of all he surveys. Too many young men are leaving the farms nowadays. It is pleasing to note that the P. E. Island government is about to provide a chance for a better agricultural education.

The disappearance of the sturdy freedom loving individual and his replacement by a servile mass of people mentally is, perhaps, the greatest human menace of the time.

In some places these organizations are able to get adequate financial support, but in many districts the extreme poverty of the community not only prevents many children from membership without financial aid from some national source. That is where King George's Jubilee Trust can help these organizations to increase facilities for physical recreation and games, for the practice of hobbies, the pursuit of interests, and the cultivation of abilities which in so many children only await their outlet.

A NATIONAL BASIS

The Trust could provide for the extension of camping and for other forms of healthy holidays, and also to give many a growing boy some of the chances for enjoyment and self-training that are at present denied him. The Trust will be able to strengthen the hands of those well known to you in your own localities, who are working with girls and boys, often under great disadvantages and with far too little support.

If you are all in agreement and we decide to open a national fund to make this Trust possible, I shall be on you all to help in organizing it on a truly national basis. I shall invite subscriptions to be sent to me in this Palace of St. James's direct, but I invite you to open local subscription lists on behalf of the Trust, and I want to make it easy for every one who desires to contribute in pennies as well as in pounds.

The Lord Mayor of London, Sir Iain Colquhoun, Lord Lieutenant of Dumfriesshire, and the Archbishop of Canterbury spoke in the whole-hearted support of the scheme.

THE YOUTH OF ENGLAND

PRINCE OF WALES LEADS IN JUBILEE TRUST

LONDON, March, 7.—The Prince of Wales inaugurated at a meeting at St. James's Palace a National Thankoffering, to be called King George's Jubilee Trust, in celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the King's accession. The fund is to be used to assist existing juvenile organizations of proved worth, and the Prince stated that he had ascertained that nothing else would give the King and Queen so much pleasure as the devotion of the offering to the welfare of the younger generation.

There were over 50 at the meeting. They included Lords Lieutenant, Lord Mayors and Mayors from England, Wales and Northern Ireland, and Lord Provoosts and Clerks from Scotland. All branches of religious life were also represented.

THE PRINCE'S SPEECH

The Prince of Wales in outlining his scheme said: "During 25 years of adversity, exertion and progress the nation has proved its unity in essential things. While it celebrates the King's jubilee with a diversity of local ceremonies and activities, it will also wish to be able to speak with one voice and to pour out its gratitude and loyal affection into one National Thankoffering."

I have given much thought to the form such a National Thankoffering should take. I can think of no cause that makes so national an appeal as the cause of the younger generation.

I have ascertained that nothing would give the King and Queen so much pleasure as a National Thankoffering devoted to the welfare of the rising generation. In common with all people, I am concerned for children, particularly with respect to that gap in their lives from the time they leave school until they reach the age of 18.

In the responsible positions that all of you hold you know not only of the existence of our great juvenile organizations, such as the Boy Scouts, the Girl Guides, the Young Brigades and clubs, the Young Men's Christian Association, only to mention a few of them—but how worth over a period of years by helping girls and boys to grow up with the ideas and the ideals that make a nation great.

I suggest the establishment of a fund, or a Trust, to be known as
