ANDREW CARNEGIE AGAIN.

Andrew Carnegie is getting old, more's the pity, and as he is still possessed of untold wealth, and also possessed of the notion that to die rich is to die disgraced, he is flinging away the millions in ten million blocks with great rapidity. Libraries, colleges, the Scotch universities, pensions for professors and teachers, a hero fund for the States and Canada, another hero fund for Germany, a peace palace at The Hague, and a fifteen million Institute in Washington lightened his load somewhat but left him yet too heavily weighted with wealth and hence unprepared to die.

So a few months ago he gave ten millions for the promotion of peace and has now given another ten millions to the Carnegie Institute in Washington. This famous institution is devoted "to encourage in the broadest and most liberal manner research and discovery, to show the application of knowledge to the improvement of mankind and to provide such buildings, laboratories, books and apparatus as may be needed." And in pursuance of this program the Carnegie Institute has already done certain things. It has sent a bronze yacht, powerless to deflect the mariner's needle, over the seven seas to chart them correctly. It experiments on ways to produce cheap cement. It is building a greater tele-

A SINGULAR ACCIDENT.

Sometimes when on a moving train the brakes are set hard, one or more of the wheels will slide along the rails, in which case a flat place is worn upon one side of the wheel. Thereafter the wheel will knock or thump on the rail at every revolution, the shock being in proportion to the extent of the flat surface, the weight which the wheel is carrying and the speed of the train. During the recent cold spell a train left St. John going westward, having one such worn car wheel. It was noticed as the train started that one wheel was thumping, but the occurrence was not taken seriously.

Now mark the result. Between St. John and McAdam Junction, a distance of about eighty miles, the damaged car wheel broke sixty-three of the heavy steel rails with which the track is laid! It is remarkable that the wheel itself, or the car axle was not broken, or the train thrown from the track, or that other trains did not come to grief on the damaged track. No doubt prompt measures were taken to effect repairs. Otherwise the occurrence is suggestive of how railway accidents may, and doubtless do occur from causes that are wholly unforeseen, some of which it would take more than human care and caution to prevent.

three fairs united in one for the whole Province, with a larger prize list and a more general competition, also increased importance and general interest. In this way the market for grains, etc., a prime object of all such fairs, would be increased and a larger number of buyers and sellers would be got together.

These considerations lead on to the fact that the agricultural organization of the Province is yet incomplete. A Central Council representative of all the Farmers' Institutes in the Island, with a certain control, and authority to speak for all has been mooted, and ought to be formed. But legislation for that purpose must first be had and it is hoped it may be supplied during the coming session of the Legislature.

Such a Council, representative of all sections of the Province should have control of the Seed Fair or Fairs, and, as we have said should be representative of the agricultural community generally. The want of it was sadly felt on the occasion of the recent farmers' delegation to Ottawa, when this Province, though most deeply interested was wholly unrepresented and its attitude in consequence was wholly misunderstood at Ottawa because there was no authority existing to send representatives to speak for our farmers collectively.

THE TRADE AGREEMENT.

The Toronto Globe is advised that the tariff agreement between Canada and the United States may be announced in Ottawa and Washington today. The Globe also foreshadows the following as a probable outline of the results:

Lower duties on or free entry of several important farm products into United States.

Free fish into United States.

A skillful bargain on paper and wood pulp, opening this market to Canada.

Free lumber as a concession to western American sentiment.

Application by Canada of intermediate instead of general tariff to a number of manufacturers from the United States. (The Canadian intermediate tariff is from 2 1/2 to 5 points lower than the general tariff.)

A Chicago mail order house recently declared a 33 1/2 per cent. dividend on its capital stock of thirty millions of dollars, it is said. If true this would seem to show that the mail order people are not in the business for purely benevolent purposes.

Sorry, but Wilbur Wright, who ought to know something about flying machines, does not agree with the esteemed editor of The Patriot. The other day in Washington he publicly expressed the opinion that "it will be many years before the aeroplane will be used for transportation."

Beattie Nesbitt, the ascending president of the Farmer's Bank was a Tory in politics. Travers, the manager of the bank, now in the penitentiary for a term, was a Liberal. There is not much to choose between two honest men who belong to different political parties, and quite a little choice between a Liberal thief and a Tory thief.

The Patriot reports that at the Liberal convention held on Tuesday in this city Premier Hazard made the announcement that "in a very short time a statement of the provincial finances would be published, and they would show that in many instances the receipts were larger than were estimated and the expenditures smaller." This is important in its way, but it will be far more important that the electors of the Second District shall have the information supplied them in good time to be fully discussed and digested before polling day.

TYPHOID FEVER AT THE CAPITAL.

OTTAWA, Jan. 24—A conservative estimate places the number of typhoid cases in this city at about 225. All the hospitals are full, and fully half the cases are being treated in the homes of the victims.
