BEAUTIFUL BUTTERFLY—There is now on exhibition at Mr. A. J. Matheson's drugstore, O'Leary, an exceptionally large and beautiful butterfly and the cocoon from which it emerged over two weeks ago. From tip to tip of the wings which are beautifully variegated and artistically pencilled, the measurement is over six and a half inches. An effort has been made to find the name of the butterfly and Mr. Matheson states that the description which most aptly applies to it is that of the great peacock moth. The cocoon was found in the woods near his home in Glenwood by Mr. Joseph Hickey, who kept it for a few days after it emerged and then forwarded it to Mr. Matheson.—O.
