Aliens Captured

(Canadian Press)
NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Feb. 12.—Crawling through a large tube serving as a conduit for electric cables under the lower arch bridge, two aliens and two alien runners reached the United States side from Canada early today. The aliens were captured by immigration border patrolmen soon after they landed, but the runners who had escorted them across escaped and returned to the Canadian side by the same route they had entered this country.

Government officials and police said the method used by the men in entering the country was the most hazardous that had ever been brought to their attention. The steel tube is open at the top but at frequent intervals heavy steel bars extend into it from the bridge structure. As the men reached these obstructions they were compelled to crawl out and swing over the turbulent Niagara which flows 200 feet below the bridge in its approach to the treacherous whirlpool rapids.

Reaching the United States end of the bridge the men descended a steel girder to the Niagara gorge railroad tracks which run along the water's edge through the gorge. The progress of the aliens and their escorts as they made the passage through the tube was noted by the immigration officers. The two men held are Andrew Ellis, 26, and Henry Garbarinsky, 30, both poles.

BIG INCREASE

LAND SETTLEMENT

The regular monthly meeting of the Catholic Women's League was held in Rosary Hall last evening at eight o'clock with the President, Mrs. W. J. McIntyre in the chair. The meeting opened with prayer, after which the minutes of the last meeting, and the treasurer's report were read and adopted. This was followed by business from the minutes, and plans were discussed whereby the good work carried on by the Society could be augmented.

The President announced, that the National Scholarship Board of the Catholic Women's League of Canada, had as their choice of subject for the 1929 Prize Essay "Canadian Immigration—the phase or aspect which most appeals to Me." Circulars setting forth the subject together with credentials, for contestants and further instructions are being issued to Diocesan Convenors of Education for distribution in their Dioceses.

During the past month, the C. W. L. has sustained a great loss by the death of Miss Belle Guerin, our First National President, poet, authoress and founder of the League in Canada, and a lady who has had the distinction of having received from the Pope, the decoration "Pro Ecclesia Pontificia." Death has also removed from our ranks, our First Honorary Life Member, Mrs. Walter Armstrong of Ottawa, to whom the C. W. L. owes a great measure of success, especially during the time of National organization in 1920, and prayers were then offered for departed members. There was present at this meeting a splendid and enthusiastic attendance of members including a delegation of the Juniors, and a hearty vote of thanks was given to Mrs. J. A. McDonald and to Mrs. W. O. Davy, for having very kindly given card parties at their homes, donating "the proceeds of same toward our charitable work. On the conclusion of all business, the meeting adjourned to meet on Tuesday, March 5th.

board being represented at an important conference to be held at Moncton on Thursday morning, re Maritime rights, which latter advice he had received by wire.

The following points will come up for discussion at the meeting:

1. The proposed revision of the C. I. R. presented to the C. N. B.
2. The securing of additional constitutional protection for Maritime Ministries.
3. Maritime unity in Western Canada.
4. The freight rate structure which most unfairly restricts Maritime distributing territory, particularly in the case of import business.
5. The adjustment of horizontal freight rate increases, as referred to in section 13, page 25 of the Duncan report.
6. The operation of the I. C. R. on the freight rate basis originally intended, and upon which it was operated for a good many years.

It was regretted that owing to the shortness of the notice received, the council would not be able to be represented, and Mr. P. ... was authorized to reply to this effect, expressing also the wish of Prince Edward Island to have representatives at future meetings of the committee.

The Market

EGGS

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 12. Canadian egg markets continue firm and unchanged today. Toronto supplies are scarce here and the market is very firm with prices unchanged. Dealers are quoting country pullets extras 34-35c; firsts 32-33c; pullet extras 34-35c; seconds 28-29c; delivered.

MONTREAL. Egg market continues strong with receipts light. B. C. eggs are offered on spot at extra 44c; firsts 41c; pullet extras 36-37c. ONTARIO Receipts continue scarce.

CALGARY—This egg market is steady with prices practically unchanged. Receipts of local fresh eggs are light but they are expected to increase as soon as the weather turns mild. Dealers are quoting country shippers delivered, cases returned, extras 30 and 32c; firsts 28-30c; seconds 23-25c.

MONTREAL, Feb. 12.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain here today was fair and a moderate amount of business was done by local exporters. The cash grain market was strong for wheat and oats at an advance of one to two cents per bushel but the inquiry from spot and country buyers was limited. Manitoba No. 6 wheat was quoted at \$1.09, feed wheat at \$1.15, No. 1 feed oats at 79c and No. 22 feed at 68c per bushel export Montreal. The undertone to the spring winter wheat flour market continued strong but values showed no further change. The demand was moderate. Winter wheat flour was steady and active business was done in all lines of millfeed with local and United States buyers and prices were firm. Standard grades of rolled oats were steady under a good inquiry. The jobbing and wholesale trade in eggs was fair and prices were well maintained. Receipts were 464 cases. Owing to the continued good demand for creamy butter from local and outside interests the undertone to the market was again strong and values were marked up another 1-2c per lb. The volume of business was large. Receipts were 12 packages. The tone of the cheese market was steady under a quiet inquiry. Receipts were 692 boxes. The potato market was firm under a good demand. Prince Edward Island green mountains sold at 85c whites at 80c, New Brunswick Green Mountains at 70c and whites at 65c per 90 lbs. in bags and ten cents less in bulk. Canadian hand-picked beans sold well at \$5.75 and yellow eye at \$5.00 per bushel.
