BRIDGETOWN HOCKEY

In a game that was packed with thrills and plenty of spills, the fast-skating Bridgetown Orioles defeated the Upton Hornets in Bridgetown on the night of March 9th by a score of 2-1. The game was witnessed by a large number of fans, who gathered from both centers to cheer their team to victory. Few penalties were handed out, although both teams checked hard and close.

The first period was scoreless with play evenly divided. Midway in the second canto, O'Leary Morris, fast-skating left winger of the Orioles, scored on a long shot from outside the Hornets' defense. Three minutes later Dale Judson, shifty right winger of the Hornets, scored from close in to make the count 1-1. In the third period, the Hornets made a desperate bid for victory, but the Orioles' rookie goalie was kicking out rubber like a veteran. The period ended scoreless, forcing the game into overtime. Both teams set a terrific pace in the overtime, the Hornets trying hard to break through the Orioles' defense. Midway through the Orioles' defense, the Hornets missed a shot which would have been a goal, but failed to realize on the advantage. With only a minute and a half to go, Elliott Currie, ace right winger of the Orioles, scored the winning goal with a hard backhand shot that caught the upper right hand corner of the net.

COOKED CELERY

Celery is very appetizing in its raw, crisp state. But there are many flavorful ways of serving it cooked. In fact, some people find it easier to digest this way.

Fried with bacon: A very tasty way of serving celery is to fry it with bacon. Wash, clean and cut the celery into two-inch lengths, and soak them in cold water, to which a little vinegar has been added, for 10 minutes.

Drain the pieces and sprinkle well with flour, then fry in the fat from the already fried bacon. Drain, place the bacon in the centre of a hot dish, and garnish with the celery.

Red and white: Celery and tomatoes are a delightful combination in this tempting dish. Cook two heads of celery in boiling water until just tender. Drain, and half fill a casserole with the celery. Skin 1 lb. of tomatoes, first plunging them into hot water for a few moments, and add these to the casserole. Season with salt and pepper, sprinkle over some grated cheese, then cook in a moderate oven for twenty minutes.

A little diced, cooked celery, folded into an omelette, makes a savoury supper dish. And remember that some soups are improved by a sprinkling of powdered celery (the young green leaves dried slowly in the oven, then crumbled up) on each plateful after it has been served.

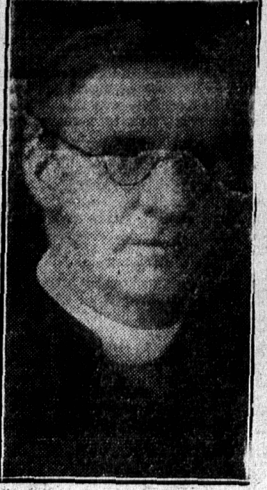
