CAMMACK WILL HANG FOR MURDER

Of William Doherty in July Last—Jury Disagreed in Son's Case and He Goes out on Bail—Episcopal Convention Agrees to Compromise in Regard to Remarriage of Divorcees.

CAMMACK WILL HANG.
WOODSTOCK, Oct. 20—(Special)—Thomas Cammack was convicted of the murder of William Doherty to-day and Judge Gregory sentenced him to be hanged January 12th.
SON TO GO FREE ON BAIL.
In the case of the son Walter Cammack, charged with being an accessory the Jury failed to agree and he will be released on \$4,000 bail.
AN ATROCIOUS MURDER.
In sentencing the murderer the Judge

dwelt upon the atrocity of the crime and said he saw no extenuating circumstances.
A COMPROMISE CANON.
BOSTON, Oct. 20—(Special)—By an overwhelming majority a compromise Canon on the Remarriage of Divorced Persons was passed by Episcopal Convention to-day.
INNOCENT MAY REMARRY.
Like the old law it permits the remarriage of innocent persons in a divorce for cause of infidelity, but no remarriage shall be allowed within one year after divorce is granted.

He has been Sir Wilfrid Laurier's railway authority, and apparently he and Sir Wilfrid parted without bitterness and without antagonism."

ASSAULT UPON PORT ARTHUR

Made on October 8 Was Repulsed—Russians Attacked Besiegers' Trenches and Were Driven Off—Japs Capture Iron Railway Bridge Near the Main Fortress—Garrison Reduced.

JAPS ATTACK PORT ARTHUR.

CHU FOO, Oct. 20—(Special)—According to Chinese advices from Port Arthur reaching here today and confirmed by Jap letters, the Japs made assaults on the remaining outerworks of Rihlung Mountain, Oct. 8, and were repulsed.

COUNTER ATTACK REPULSED.

The following day Russians made an attack on the Jap trenches and they in turn were repulsed.

JAPS TAKE RAILWAY BRIDGE.

The Japs immediately followed with another assault, resulting in the capture

of the iron railroad bridge 300 yards from the main fortress.

THE DEPLETED GARRISON.

It is asserted that the Russians have now only 5,000 men at Port Arthur available for fighting.

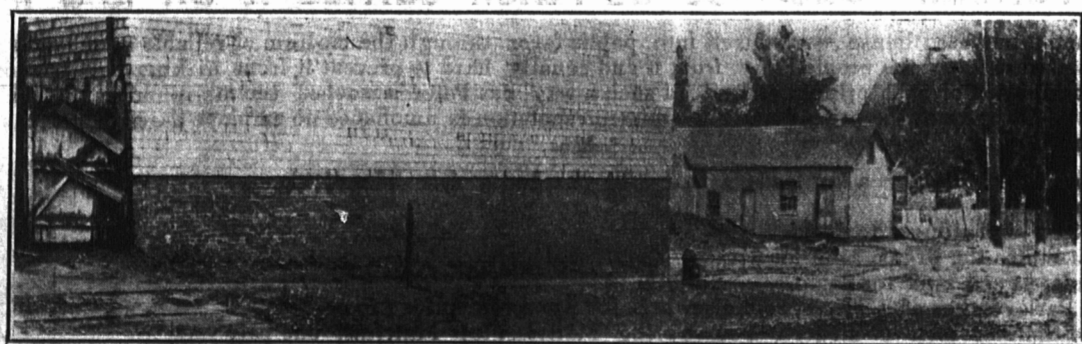
