IN SPORTING CIRCLES.—John Kilonis, claimant to the middle-weight wrestling championship of the world, and holder of the Lord Londale belt, won a finish match from Bull Montana, champion light heavy-weight of South America, by the disqualification of Montana though hitting Kilonis repeatedly with his clenched fist, says an Amherst exchange, Montana securing the first fall in twenty-eight minutes with a farther arm and body hold. The first bout was fast and both men were exhausted. After a ten minute rest the men again started for each other, and after stalling some time for holds they went on the mat. Kilonis took advantage of a back crotch hold and started Montana on a merry-go-round or body swing. He secured the fall in thirteen minutes. Montana was completely done and on returning to the mat started foiling. He was warned by referee Webster Fraser, but repeated the offence and was disqualified, the match going to Kilonis. About five hundred people were present and were exceedingly pleased with the affair. Both wrestlers have performed in Charlottetown.
