**SEED POTATO SHIPMENTS**—The P.E.I. Potato Growers Association has been, despite the poor price and small demand for seed potatoes, very successful in disposing of a large part of the certified stock. At the present time eighty cars have been billed out with orders yet uncompleted for over fifty cars. The above shipment includes a cargo of 27,000 bushels shipped by the S.S. Stavangeren to Norfolk, Virginia. The steamer sailed the afternoon of Oct. 25th. On the 31st, the secretary of the association received a wire from the consigners stating "steamer arrived, cargo half unloaded, fine condition." The Association contemplates loading another steamer this week, then leave their members able to find sufficient storage for the balance of their certified seed for which there will be a strong demand in March, the time when the farmers of Long Island begin their planting.
