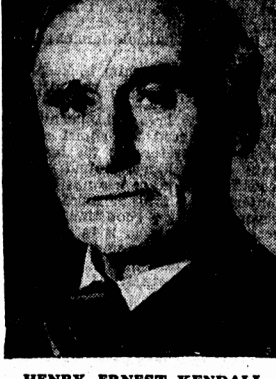
Dies In Hospital

Decision Makes Clear Trend Of U. S. Policy

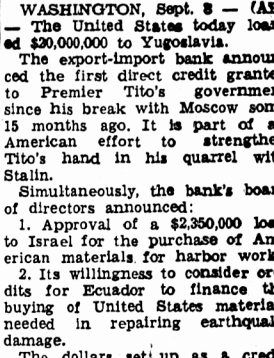
