RHEIMS CATHEDRAL MAY BE RESTORED

LONDON, Sept. 23.—The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Rheims sends the following story of the situation at that point:—
"To the visitor, Rheims, wreathed in smoke and echoing with the boom of cannonading, presents a forlorn and desolate sight. Everywhere there is evidence of damage done by the shells of the big howitzers. Whole houses are seen with their interiors smashed into shapeless mass of bricks, mortar and wood. Around the cathedral, hardly a house escaped damage. In front of the facade of the cathedral stands a statue of Joan of Arc. The figure is unscathed, but the horse and pedestal are chipped and seared by shells and the flames.
"At first the exterior of the cathedral does not appear to be much damaged, although the masonry is chipped, seared and whitened by countless shrapnel bullets, while the carved figures and gargoyles have been broken off. In the door way still stands the crippled beggar who has sought alms there for many years. He maintained his position throughout the bombardment and like a statue he stands, covered with dust and glass. The man was unharmed. He was crippled in the war of 1870.
"An examination of the interior shows that the better part of fifty shells had found lodgement, but luckily, the range being very great, the solid masonry of the building had resisted the successive shots. It was the ancient and priceless glass of the windows which suffered the most. In the centre of the vault the great candelabra which hung from the roof lies broken in the centre of the floor amid a great mass of debris.
"The general impression is that the cathedral can be restored, although most of its priceless decorations are ruined. Some of the German wounded are still in the cathedral. Several of them were killed by shrapnel bullets during the bombardment which is in progress, doubtless to report the success of the cannonading. They flew high and the French did not trouble to fire at them.

BIG PARADE OF SAILORS AND SOLDIERS.

HALIFAX, Sept. 23.—Halifax turned out in force yesterday to cheer the crew of H. M. C. S. Niobe and the Lincolnshire Regiment as these two gallant units paraded the streets and everywhere they marched the men got an enthusiastic welcome. Thousands on thousands of British sailors and soldiers have marched through this city in past years, but none ever made a better impression than the men who were seen here yesterday. The City expected a good showing from the Lincolnshires, one of the historic regiments of the British Army, but it was more than surprised and gratified at the magnificent appearance of the Niobe's men, particularly as it was the first time this body of American bluejackets had ever landed. "They are a credit to Canada and the Navy" was the expression heard all along the route and it was more than true.

A considerable proportion of the bluejackets came to the Niobe with Capt. Corbett from H. M. S. Algerine, but more than 60 per cent of the ship's company is composed of Canadian volunteers, the majority of whom had previously served in the navy or Newfoundland Reservists. But it was impossible to pick the different men out in the splendid battalion that swung along to the inspiring strains of "O Canada" the world over.
"A life on the Ocean Wave" yesterday morning. All had the same well set up, clean cut appearance that marks the British bluejacket the world over.

British sailors always get a warm reception in Halifax, but the crowd showed no favoritism this morning. The thousand sturdy men of the Lincolnshires got every bit as enthusiastic a reception as the Niobe's men. All along the streets, cheer after cheer rang out as the sturdy men in khaki went by and the broad grin on the face of every prespiring Tommy as he stepped out to the strains of the Regiment's magnificent band, showed that the greeting of Halifax was appreciated, and reciprocated.

Shortly before eight o'clock the transport Canada pulled into Deep-water terminus and the Lincolnshires landed and marched down Water Street to the Customs House where they joined the blue-jackets.

The Canadian Tars, five hundred strong, came ashore just before nine o'clock and landed at the King's wharf. The uniform excellent physique and well set up, appearance of the men had been generally remarked whenever they had as landing party, they made a truly fine showing. A head came their mascot, William, a Pictian Island goat presented to the Algerine's crew, who, it is claimed, can eat anything but professes a particular relish for Germans. William had a fitting sense of importance as he paced solemnly ahead of the men with a Niobe cap ribbon twined round his horns and a bunch of red white and blue around his neck.

Two field guns, dragged by blue-jackets, preceded by their band, then came the battalions of blue-jackets. The sailors marched up George Street, the Lincolnshires falling in behind them, and turned down Barington Street, proceeding along Spring Garden Road, South Park and Inglis Street proceeding along Spring Garden along the way, they met with an enthusiastic reception. At every corner a crowd gathered and set up a cheer.

Arriving in the Park, the men piled arms and fell out for a smoke, the sailors and soldiers cordially fraternizing. After half an hour's rest the march was resumed, the men proceeding along Pleasant Street to Morris thence to Hollis and so back to the corner of George and Water Streets where the two corps separated, the Lincolnshires marching to the transport and the sailors to their boats at the King's wharf.

Passing the Ladies College, the whole school was massed out on the street to cheer the men, and the pupils, waving flags, gave them as hearty a welcome as they received anywhere. Here the Niobe's band swung into "O Canada" in which the young pupils joined, and as the Lincolnshires came up, their band which had been playing the regimental "leaf" whereat the volley of cheers quickest changed into the "Maple redoubled.

Mayor Bligh and Deputy Mayor Powell inspected the men as they passed the City Hall and complimented both Capt. Corbett and Colonel McAndrew on the fine appearance of their men. The Canadian sailors saluted the mayor with "eyes right," as they marched south.
