NEW YORK, July 8—Between a hundred and fifty and a hundred and seventy-five million dollars in securities of some 40 public utility companies and the finances of prominent banking houses were involved in the failure of J. S. and W. S. Kuhn of Pittsburg through the suspension of First Second National Bank of Pittsburg and the First National Bank of McKeesport which they controlled and the receivership for the other concerns which they controlled.
