The Northumberland arrived about seven o'clock Saturday evening.

A correspondent says the ice in Cardigan shows no sign of breaking up.

Lowe Bros., City, have secured the contract for the new bank of Montreal.

Mrs. W. F. Tidmarsh and son Clarence left this Saturday on a visit to Boston.

The outward cargo by the Minto on Saturday included three carloads mixed freight.

The Plant Line will make their first sailing of the season from Boston Saturday, May 9th.

The steamer Liberty, Capt. Murphy, arrived in port here Saturday from Halifax to resume work on the Railway wharf.

The schr. Eva May, Capt. Davis, and the schr. Daisy, Capt. Moore came into port yesterday from Picton laden with coal.

Miss Ruth Wright, City, has returned home from the Prince Edward Island hospital, and is, it is pleasing to learn, steadily improving.

A good deal of light ice from up the rivers liberated by the heat of the past few days drifted down and filled up Charlottetown harbor yesterday. Most of it went out with the tide.

The lobster boat known as the Yret owned by D. J. McLean, Canoe Cove, was badly damaged, also two boats owned by McRae Bros., while putting their traps out on the 10th inst.

Owing to the heavy ice which drifted into the harbor from Pownal and Orwell Bays on Saturday morning the Northumberland had to return to port but got clear again shortly before 9 o'clock.

The body of the late James Jeffrey Roche arrived at New York by the Kaiser Wilhelm on Wednesday and was immediately forwarded to Boston where the funeral took place Friday. Interment was at Holyhead Cemetery in Brookline.

Rev. T. A. Moore, General Secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance preached at Zion Church yesterday morning, and at Baptist Church in the evening. He also addressed the Y.M.C.A. Meeting in the afternoon. All his discourses were listened to by large and appreciative audiences.

She was forced ashore, on the Keppoch side, by the drifting ice and her rudder was smashed. The ice was very heavy and the schooner at its mercy. So strong was the bridge that the S. S. Northumberland was unable to get through it in the morning on her way to Picton and had to wait till later to get out of port. At high tide on Saturday, however, a tug went to the aid of the Nellie Morrow and got her safely into port. She is now tied up at the railway wharf, discharging.

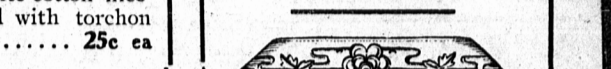

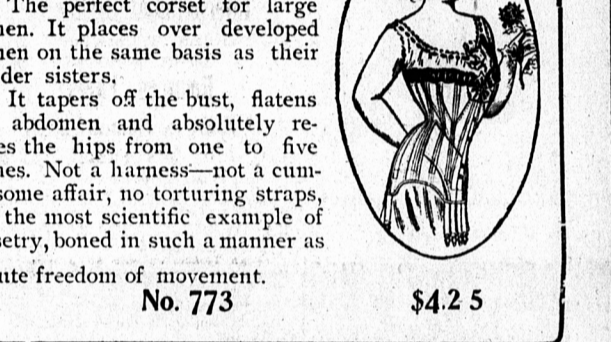
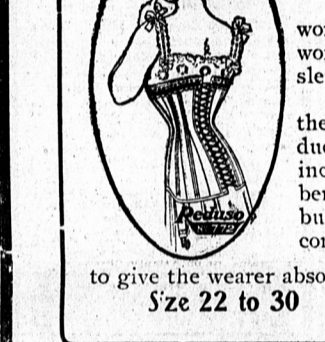
