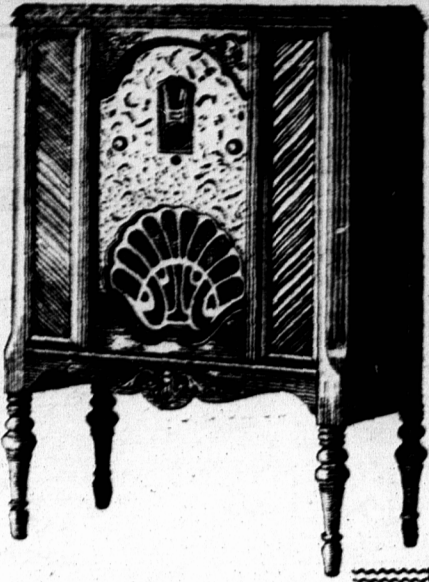
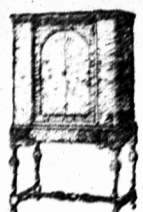

CANADIAN APPLES TO THE FORE

Canadian apples were very much in the limelight at the Imperial Fruit Show held at Birmingham, Eng. from Oct. 25 to Nov. 2. In the Overseas Section, open to growers and exporters in any part of the Empire, Canadian exhibits won first prize in fourteen out of fifteen classes. Nova Scotia won ten of these for the following varieties: Cox's Orange Pippin, Wealthy, King, Golden Russet, Spy, Greening, Gravenstein, Wagner, and Blenheim. British Columbia won the other four with McIntosh, Jonathan, Delicious and Newtown Pippin. Ontario and Quebec were represented in the non-competitive classes and staged very attractive displays.

In the British Empire Section for apples grown in Canada, the first and second prizes in the class for twenty-five boxes of a dessert apple was won by the Associated Growers of British Columbia, Vernon, B.C.

A Nova Scotia exhibitor won the prize for four half-boxes of dessert pears. It is gratifying to find that the Maritimes have made so conspicuous a showing, even if we ourselves are tardy in this matter.

FORAGE PLANTS.

The report for the Division of Forage Plants for the year 1928, is just out and contains much that is interesting. The Station at Harrow, Ont., specialized on corn, soybeans, sugar beets and broom corn. Marked advance was noted in some of the varieties of field corn originating at the Station, and it was also observed that the normal date plantings of late maturing varieties had less ear-derivation from the dreaded corn-borer. The advice as to the soy-bean is not to grow it in this country for either hay or seed purposes; the season is too short for it. This also was my experience some years ago in this province.

Sugar beet has improved vastly since the days when it contained from 5 to 8 per cent of sucrose (sugar). Some statistics in the report are: highest percentage of sucrose, 13.2; highest average weight per beet, 1.6 lbs.; highest yield per acre, 19 tons 225 lbs.; and highest relative yield of sugar 130.4, taking the average yield as 100. In all 30 varieties from various sources were tested. All classes of stock seem fond of sugar-beet, notwithstanding the acid which it contains.

The variety test of broom corn is given in an interesting tabular statement. This plant produces two crops—the "brush" itself and the fodder. The latter yield is high, one variety giving close upon eleven tons of green fodder to the acre, while the lowest yielding variety gave 141 cwt. The dwarf varieties gave the greatest yields of brush, with fewest "goose-necks" in the straw.

The Experimental Farm at Ottawa gives the results of work amongst-ensilage corn, sunflowers, fleshy annual pastures, grasses, red clover, and alfalfa.

Mammoth Russian Sunflower gave the phenomenal yield of 40 tons 551 lbs. of green yield per acre, equivalent to 6 tons 265 lbs. of dry matter. "In districts where corn cannot be grown to advantage, and in particular instances where the smothering of weeds is of special importance the sunflower offers possibilities worth consideration." The "fleshy pastures" section introduces a substitute for common rope or the ordinary types of kale, in the form of the Marrow Kales which are from two to four times as productive. Research work is being continued on special strains of timothy, meadow fescue, orchard grass, and red-top.

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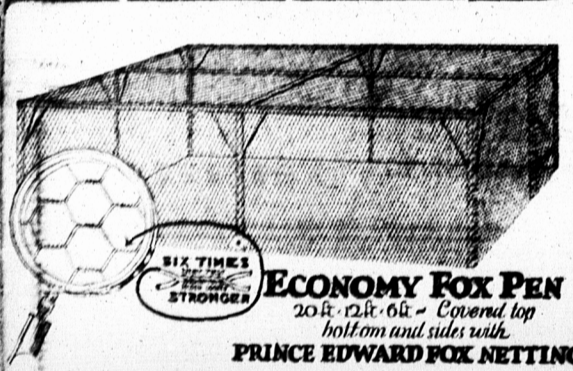
