DEATH OF PILOT DEAN—Dr. J. Dean received word late Saturday night of the death at Winnipeg, of Geoffrey Dean, the well known pilot, who spent two years flying mail between Moncton, Summerside, Charlottetown and the Island. He visited the Island last summer demonstrating the airplane owned by the British Empire, had seen service during the war, and was regarded as a skilled and experienced pilot. He was the first and only man to fly an autogiro, which he did in Charlottetown last summer. A few days ago Mrs. Jenkins received a telegram from him stating that he was asked to carry on a western trip but that he had made arrangements to come on the Island and run. He was sent west instead. Dean had many friends in this city who will learn with deep regret of his untimely death.

PRESIDENT OF ST. NICHOLAS—Mrs. DesRoches, of St. Nicholas, at 74 years of age. The deceased was a native of St. Nicholas and had resided there all his life. He was highly esteemed and had a large circle of friends. He had been ill for several months but the illness came rather suddenly. There were to mourn, his widow, four daughters and two sons, Mrs. John DesRoches, with whom he lived, Mrs. Bernice and Celena and one son, Emmanuel, is in Moncton. He leaves four brothers, Andrew, George and Cyrus, of Muddy Creek, and Miss Mary M. DesRoches, of St. Nicholas. The funeral takes place this morning at 10 a.m. from the R. C. Church.

Debentures to the amount of \$100,000 are to be issued by the City to pay for unemployment expenditure, permanent works and outstanding deficits, according to a decision approved at the first regular monthly meeting of the new City Council last night. The finance committee of the Council was also authorized to invest \$105,000 of sinking funds in bonds of the Dominion of Canada, C. N. R. and Province of Ontario.

JUDGMENT GIVEN—At a session of the Supreme Court which opened at 11 o'clock yesterday morning with Mr. Justice Arsenault and Mr. Justice Saunders on the Bench, Mr. Justice Saunders gave judgment in the appeal case of Mr. Theobald against a fine imposed in the Magistrate's Court on a charge of keeping his restaurant open during prohibited hours, allowing the appeal and declaring the by-law under which he was convicted ultra-vires. Mr. Justice Saunders concurred. Mr. J. J. Johnson, K. C., for appellant, Mr. K. J. Martin for respondent. The case of Ritchie vs. Rayner was begun in the Supreme Court yesterday before Mr. Justice Arsenault and the following jury: James McAleer, (foreman), Ewen Lamont, Roderick McLeod, Colin McKay, James McKay, John McQuigley, Percy McDonald. Mr. J. O. Campbell is appearing for the plaintiff, and Mr. W. E. Bentley, K. C., for the defendant. Evidence is still being heard in the case.

DISASTROUS FIRE—A very disastrous fire occurred at Green Road on Saturday, February 20th, when the splendid dwelling of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Towle was destroyed. About eight o'clock in the morning, Mr. Towle was about the stable doing up his chores, when his wife called to him that the chimney was on fire, and he, upon investigating, found the attic enveloped in flames. The teacher, Miss Cusack who was boarding there at the time ran for help, but before help arrived the fire got beyond control. The neighbors worked hurriedly in trying to save the furniture and succeeded in saving much of what was down stairs but the contents of the pantry and also all up stairs including all their clothing, was destroyed. Since the fire the neighbors gathered and cut the lumber for another house which goes to show the generosity of the people. The loss is about \$1500 partially covered by insurance.

DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY—The 88th Annual Executive meeting of the Diocesan Church Society was held yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock in St. Paul's Parish Hall, with Venerable Archdeacon White, D. The Archdeacon informed those present that His Grace the Archbishop expected to pay an official visit to the Island from 19th to 26th June. A request to appoint representatives to the Temperance Federation from the Anglican Church was allowed to stand over for the present. Certain routine business was transacted, several laymen taking part in the discussion, after which the meeting adjourned to meet at the mens meeting to be held in St. Peter's Cathedral today at 2.30 p.m. Evensong was held in St. Peter's Cathedral last evening at 7.30, when the prayers were taken by Rev. Mr. Bridgewater and Canon Malone. The lessons were read by Rev. Mr. Spriggs and Rev. Mr. Coleman. The Miserere (51st Psalm) was sung as a prayer. The Rev. Mr. Westbrooke, Rector of Milton, preached a splendid sermon, from the 14th and 15th verses of the 16th chapter of Jeremiah. The Venerable Archdeacon White pronounced the benediction.

Letters and Telegrams were received from Sisters and Brothers, some residing in the United States and different parts of Canada. About 158 responded to their names on the roll. Among those present were: Sister Ruby Houle, Vice-President of the Rebekah Assembly; Bro. Bremner, Past Grand Master; Bro. John McNair, Past Grand Master. All were greatly interested in the wonderful work done by their energetic lodge. Alpha Rebekah Lodge has had a very successful year and the large number in attendance shows the interest which is taken in the work of the Order. After closing Lodge, refreshments were served.

GRAVE NEED OF PRACTISING EVERY ECONOMY consistent with efficiency in the various essential departments of Government was emphasized by the Hon. J. D. Stewart, K. C., Premier of the Province, in the course of his Budget speech in the Legislature last night. The total revenues of the Province for 1932 the Premier estimated at \$1,209,870.88. The total expenditures, exclusive of a sum sufficient to rebuild Falconwood Hospital and Prince of Wales College, were estimated at \$1,207,465.

Details of estimated revenue were given by the Premier as follows: Dominion subsidy, \$497,181.88; C. N. R. property tax, \$40,000; public lands \$100; Provincial Secretary's fees \$1,250; Prothonotary's fees, \$2,500; Registry office \$6,500; County Courts, \$1,500; Falconwood Hospital, \$10,000; Private bills, \$350; P. W. C. fees, \$3,000; Fines and penalties, \$1,200; Succession duties, \$25,000; Casual revenue, \$8,000; Fire insurance companies, \$12,000; life insurance companies, \$9,000; acceptance corporation companies, \$800; accident and guarantee companies, \$1,000; domicile companies, \$45,000; trust and loan companies, \$1,700; telegraph company, \$800; electric light companies, \$2,000; telephone company, \$2,500; steamship companies, \$600; brokers, \$1,000; banks \$15,000; peddlers licenses, \$1,000; life insurance agents, \$350; fire insurance agents, \$39; motor vehicle licenses, \$137,000; Department of Agriculture (technical) \$30,000; Department of Agriculture receipts, \$4,000; Department of Health, \$17,500; Prohibition Commission, \$28,000; direct relief, \$8,000; amusement tax, \$8,000; gasoline tax, \$180,000; real estate, income, property, road, etc., \$115,000; road arrears of taxes, \$20,000. Total \$1,209,870.88.

The jury brought in a verdict against the defendant, awarding the plaintiff \$5,000 damages.

DIED IN DENMARK—Mr. Albert Weeks, of Carleton, received a letter recently from Rev. M. Andreasen, of Denmark, informing him of the death of Paul Hansen. He passed away Jan. 7th, there being no particulars. His parents requested the pastor to write them. He had lived with Mr. Weeks for two years and last April took sick and was removed to Prince County Hospital and after a time sufficiently recovered to start for home in June. No doubt his friends will feel very bad as he was a favorite with all.
