The sessions will be held here during the first week of October and between three and four hundred delegates will be in attendance. Rev. Angus McMillan, of Marion Bridge, Cape Briton, is the moderator.

HERO WELCOMED HOME.—A hearty welcome awaited Sergt. L. W. Mellett, Tuesday evening, when he arrived in Souris from his many acquaintances especially his uncle, M. C. C. Carlton, and his sister, Miss Susie. Sergt. Mellett enlisted in Alberton four years ago, and on arrival in England was transferred to the Mechanical Transport Imperial Army Service, then being organized for service in East Africa, where the Germans were strongly entrenched, and although undergoing many trying experiences had the proud satisfaction of seeing the last German general surrender. Sgt. Mellett returns west in a couple of weeks.

NURSING SISTER NICHOLSON HOME.—Nursing sister Elsie Nicholson, C. E. F. daughter of Mr. Donald Nicholson, M. P. and Mrs. Nicholson, returned home Saturday night after four years at the front. Miss Nicholson went overseas May 1st, 1915 and with the exception of one short vacation has been on duty in France ever since. Miss Nicholson looks well after her trying experiences but is glad to be home again and away from the horrors of war, as realized in the casualty stations and hospitals in the battle zone. She had the honor to be among the nurses mentioned in special despatches by Sir Douglas Haig. She has a sister Miss Emma, a V. A. D. in England.

Burke. Lieut. Conrad left here with the No. 2 Siege Battery (later the 98th) under command of Col. Peake. He was wounded in France and also received the Military Medal. C. A. Conrad left with the 2nd Siege Draft in November, 1917, and was in England when the armistice was signed. These two brave lads are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Conrad, Water street. Sergt. Hilchey is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hilchey of Georgetown. He left with the 104th of N. S. in 1916. For a time he was an instructor at several of the Canadian military camps. Later he went to France where he was wounded in August, 1918. Ptes. W. Yoston and M. Burke left with the 105th and both have seen active service in France. Pte. Yoston is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Yoston, of Georgetown. Needless to say these brave lads are cordially welcomed home by a large circle of friends.

LAID TO REST.—The flag over the Great War Veterans Hall was at half-mast Saturday for the death of their comrade, Pte. Ernest Divine of Hunter River, whose death occurred in the Dalton Sanatorium on Wednesday at 2 p.m. Deceased enlisted in the 105th and took part in considerable fighting in France. He was badly gassed as the result of which his lungs were so affected that he was rendered unfit for further service and his death was the final outcome. Deep regret is felt at the passing of this young man who has given his life for his country as much as if he had died on the fields of France or Flanders. The funeral to Lot 65 Chapel which was largely attended was conducted by Rev. Fr. Curran. Comrades Lawrence Caudet and N. McDonald represented the G. W. V. A.

RECOVERING FROM INJURY.—His friends are pleased to see Mr. Arthur Vatcher, of the Rollo Hose Co., out again after being laid up for three weeks with a fracture of the right leg. He sustained this accident while working at the new Bank of Commerce at Hunter River, putting on the finishing touches for the sign, when the staging broke and the two men on it, Mr. Charles Cudmore and Mr. Vatcher, were precipitated to the ground, a distance of about fifteen feet. Both landed on their feet, the former escaping injury, but Mr. Vatcher had one of the smaller bones of his leg broken, which caused him a good deal of pain and inconvenience.
