ROOSEVELT AND A THIRD TERM.

No President of the United States has yet occupied the Presidential office for more than two terms, but there is nothing in the constitution to prevent such an occurrence. There has been from the beginning among the plain people an underlying fear that a too prolonged term of rule might in some way endanger or impair the safety of the national fabric. The matter has been many times under discussion from the days of Washington down, and is revived now, because of President Roosevelt's popularity and the desire of many that he should be renominated.

Mr. Roosevelt has several times publicly expressed his determination to retire at the end of his present term. Indeed it would be difficult for him to make his declination of another nomination more emphatic than he has already made it without "protesting too much." And yet there are many who apparently still believe that his scruples and the traditions of the office will be overcome, and that he may be almost forced to yield to the pressure brought upon him and again contest a Presidential election, in which case he would in all human probability be elected.

It was the charge against Caesar that he was "ambitious" even when he thrice refused the crown. For that matter most leaders of men are possessed of ambition and doubtless President Roosevelt is not without that quality, "the last infirmity of noble minds." But we see no good reason to doubt his sincerity, or the strength and finality of his determination to retire. And yet many of his own people are distrustful, and the New York Herald seems to share in this feeling, judging from its recent editorial deliverance entitled "Mr. Roosevelt's Chance to go Down to Posterity as a Second Washington."

The Herald would have the President not only decline a further term of power, but to set the matter once and forever at rest by publicly taking "Governor Hughes under his wing as his candidate for the Presidency." This he is not likely to do. He has shown no indications as of favor for Governor Hughes, and the latter has always been exceedingly reticent of his opinion of the President. Mr. Roosevelt, like Jefferson in his time, has been charged with desiring "to obtain a third nomination under guise of declining it." His ways are, indeed, somewhat inscrutable. A third term would, in one way, give the President a pre-eminence over all his predecessors who have held office for but two terms at most. And the temptation may be the stronger for that reason.

LIMITING THE HEIGHT OF TALL BUILDINGS.

Since the days when private ownership on the earth's surface began there has grown up a belief that the title in real estate extends downward to the centre of the earth and upward to the sky. You may not dig beneath your neighbor's property nor build above him, whether his terrestrial possessions are limited to a few square feet or extend to a thousand square miles. He on his part may dig or build as high as he pleases, always providing that his digging or building do not interfere with or endanger the rights of his neighbors or the public.

Such has been the prevalent opinion and on the strength of it property owners in New York have sunk foundations deep into the rock and have raised on these foundations, buildings hundreds of feet in height. Recently the building authorities in New York have challenge

this immemorial right and have prescribed a limit of 250 feet in height for the buildings hereafter to be erected in that city. This would still give room for twenty stories of 12 feet each one above another, which would seem to be sufficient for all reasonable demands.

But the legality of this building ordinance is denied by the property owners and the lower courts have held that it is invalid, and that the city has no right thus to deprive a man of the value of his property. The ordinance is suspended pending an appeal and a tremendous legal battle is expected in the final Court of Appeals. Perish the thought that a man may not build as high as he likes on his own land! Since the days of the Tower of Babel this right has passed unchallenged. Besides, if the civic authorities may limit the height of buildings to 250 feet, what shall prevent them hereafter placing the limit at 100, or 70, or 50 feet?

An old subscriber writing from Wood Islands West makes complaint that "patients from the General Hospital, Charlottetown were discharged on Tuesday the 5th instant while two new cases of smallpox developed in said hospital on the following Friday and Saturday." He also inquires whether the Government or the patients, or both have to pay for vaccination? The answer is that the patients and not the Government have to pay.

The growing prevalence of typhoid fever in the city, where the water supply is believed to be of exceptional purity, has given rise to an impression among some citizens that the milk supply may be at fault and The Guardian is asked to advocate the appointment of an inspector by the City, such inspector to visit the farms whence the milk supplies come, the vessels in which it is conveyed and the milk itself. It seems to be of vital importance to ascertain, if possible, why there should be thirty-six or more cases of typhoid now in the City.
