**ANOTHER FOX COMPANY.**—Mr. J. C. McKendrick of Campbellton, P. E. I., returned last week from a visit to Boston, Mass., where he succeeded in forming a large fox company which was incorporated in the State of Massachusetts, last Friday. The company has a capitalization of \$350,000 and a number of Canadians now resident in Boston are interested. The directors are Messrs A. L. Stark, President; W. B. Purdy, Secretary; J. E. Newson, Treasurer and J. C. McKendrick, Business Manager for P. E. Island. Mr. McKendrick has sold the company 14 pairs of P. E. Island's best foxes, including four pairs from the Dalton Ranch. The intention of the company at first was to build the ranch in New Hampshire but Mr. McKendrick insisted upon having it in Prince Edward Island, on the plea that the northern belt, including P. E. Island, part of New Brunswick and the lower part of Quebec was better adapted for the raising of higher priced foxes than any other part of the continent. So insistent was he that he succeeded in inducing the other members of the company to correspond with the fur dealers in London, New York and Montreal with the result that his statement as to P. E. Island's claims were corroborated. It was then finally decided to build the ranch in Prince Edward Island. Mr. McKendrick is now looking for a site and will start the ranch in the vicinity of Charlottetown if a suitable location can be found. The ranch is to be built this summer. Mr. McKendrick is to be congratulated on enlisting the sympathy and investments of United States capitalists in this great enterprise and his fellow Prince Edward Islanders will wish him every success in the venture.

**BRITAIN SWEEP BY BLIZZARD.**

LONDON, April 12—Winter has returned to terrify April, and yesterday a large part of England was swept by a blizzard, which in some districts lasted over ten hours, and brought down several inches of snow.  
In London during the afternoon, snow fell for some time, but, fortunately, it melted as soon as it touched the ground. Almost the whole day was rainy.

Elsewhere conditions were far worse. In the Derbyshire Park district, a great storm raged over ten hours, growing heavier hour by hour. Several inches fell in dales and on hills. The fall was very heavy around Doncaster and in West Riding. Snow fell all day in Scotland, and especially along the western seaboard the fall was very severe. Starting at seven o'clock in the morning, snow fell without intermission all day, and was still falling late last night. The storm will be disastrous to young lambs on the hill farms, and heavy losses are expected.  
The outlook for the immediate future is equally depressing. Rain and snow are predicted for today in almost all directions.

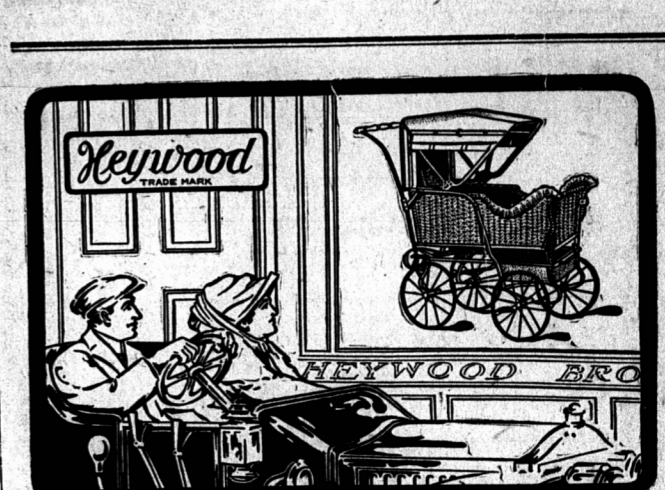
