The visitors took the offensive at the start and after five minutes of play planted the piskin behind convert was tried, but fell short. This was the only score of the game.

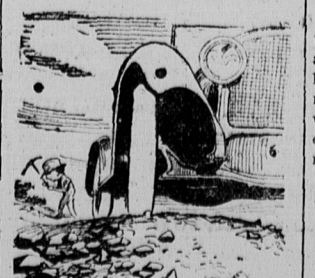
