The funeral of the late William Webb, City, took place yesterday afternoon at three o'clock to the People's Cemetery.

The steamer Harland arrived in port from Orwell yesterday morning at ten o'clock with a heavy freight and sixty passengers. She returned at three in the afternoon.

Mrs Charles Lyons, City, leaves this morning on a visit to Halifax.

M. Beaton and family, Hunter River, intend leaving shortly for the West.

Miss Janie B. McRae of Hunter River has returned home after a weeks visit with friends at North Wilshire.

Neil McDonald, Belfast, and R. A. McKenzie, Flat River, were among the visitors to the city yesterday and registered at the Queen.

D. A. and Mrs. McLeod, Hunter River, who have been visiting for the past three months in Western Canada are expected home shortly.

Activities along the water front indicate an early resumption of the usual summer harbor traffic. Schooners are being fitted out and the other craft are being made in readiness for the coming season's work. The tug Fred M. Batt was launched recently and yesterday a new boiler was placed in position, and she will be ready for work shortly. The William Aitken is still out of the water but will probably slip off the ways tomorrow, after having received a general overhauling. Smaller craft are being prepared for the water, such as steam and gasoline launches and sail boats. The latter seem to be becoming scarcer every year and it is rather difficult to get a good one at the present time as they have dwindled down perceptibly in numbers and nearly all of those left are of the fast ones. The daughters are Mrs. William Catto, wife of a prominent hotel man in Washington, D. C.; Mrs. Glennie and Mrs. Cannon, Dorchester, Mass.; and Mrs. Bunlin, New London. The remains will be brought from Dorchester, Mass., and laid to rest in the family plot at New London.

John Sterling and Miss Margaret Ross were united in the Holy bonds of matrimony. The ceremony was a very joyous one and was performed by Rev. Mr. Strathie assisted by Rev. After the ceremony the bride and groom were driven to the station where they took passage for Summerside from whence they proceeded to Montreal, Toronto and other Canadian cities, being absent on their wedding tour for about a month.
