ANTWERP MAY SPELL DEFEAT OF ENEMY

Captured Nazi Order Shows German Fears

WITH THE 1ST CANADIAN ARMY IN HOLLAND, Oct. 31 — (CP Cable) — A captured German order, issued by Gen. Gustav Von Zangen, commander of the German 15th Army, showed today that the enemy High Command fears that once Antwerp is being used as a supply port, a death blow might be delivered at Northern Germany and Berlin itself before the winter.

LONDON, Oct. 31 — (AP) — British and Canadian armored forces, operating under extreme difficulties of weather and terrain, fought through to the Maas (Meuse) River north of Tilburg tonight and closed within a half-mile of the Geertruidenberg bridge, one of the main escape routes for German troops fleeing southwestward.

Home After 50 Operational Flights

Flying Officer James Hornby, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Hornby, 25 Fitzroy Street, Charlottetown, arrived home last night from overseas via New York. FO Hornby enlisted in the R. C. A. F. on June 11th, 1940 and after training in various camps throughout Ontario and the Maritime, left for England on March 10th, 1942. FO Hornby made fifty operational flights over Germany. He now expects to be allocated to instruction work in Canada.

275-Bed Hospital At Windsor, N. S.

HALIFAX, Oct. 31 — (CP) — A military hospital with a 275-bed capacity has been built at Windsor, N. S., the army announced here today. The hospital, a temporary structure, is one of the largest in the east coast region. Primary use of the hospital, the army said, will be for the care of Canadian soldiers wounded in Europe. It will be several weeks before it goes into operation. Maj. C. MacDonald of Sydney, N. S., has been appointed commanding officer.

Churchill Expects War To Last Two Years

LONDON, Oct. 31 — (CP) — Prime Minister Churchill, seeking to prolong the tenure of the present parliament, told the House of Commons today "it seems difficult to believe" that the war against Germany will end before early summer.

Red Army Continues Advance On Budapest
