Gene Autry Back In New Thriller Of Golden West

All the enchantment of the Painted Desert region at sundown has been recaptured by Republic Pictures in their latest Gene Autry musical western, "Heart of the Rio Grande" which opens today at the Capitol Theatre.

Autry, who is somewhat of a national hero because of his inspirational example of sportsmanship and fair play, has a tremendous influence with a large percentage of the younger generation, and such films as this give a new captain his appeal to an entirely different but equally enthusiastic audience—these adults and young in heart, who love good, red-blooded action combined with youthful, gay romance.

A number of elements combine to make "Heart of the Rio Grande," a stand-out among the Autry films. One is the inclusion of Edith Fellows, who at last has a good, meaty role with which to prove her abilities. Sarah Padden, a tried and true character actress, scores in the role of "Mrs. Captain Forbes," the stout-hearted widow of a Texas pioneer who keeps the Smoke River Ranch going in the face of greatest odds.

Royal Mounted Patrol Co-Stars Starrett, Hayden

According to advance notices, Empire Theatre patrons are in for a double order of thrills and excitement to-night when Columbia's "The Royal Mounted Patrol" makes its local bow with two great action stars teamed in the leading roles. Charles Starrett and Lloyd Bridges, most popular cowboy stars joins forces with Russell Hayden, veteran of the Hopalong Cassidy hits, in what promises to be a truly great outdoor drama of the great Northwest.

Directed by Lambert Hillyer, the story is said to be a thrill-packed adventure yarn dealing with the modern day "cowboy" in the Canadian "Mounties" and their determined efforts to always get their man Starrett, whose most recent local appearance was in "Prairie Stranger," is seen as a cowboy recruit in the Royal Mounted Patrol, while Hayden plays a well-known movie-rookie in the Canadian Air Patrol.

Support War Effort With Work, Money and Blood

AMONG the several Red Cross Blood Donor Clinics established in Canada the one pictured above is unique. The usual clinic is located in a city with volunteer donors drawn from that city's population but this one is in the heart of the great Ford plant at Windsor and the donors have all been company employees of doctors. With a regular staff of doctors and nurses, supplemented by volunteer nurses, the modern equipped clinic is operated five days a week with an average of 200 donors each week. In addition to giving their blood to the Red Cross, Ford employees conducted their own canvass of the plant in the recent Red Cross drive and 13,722 employees gave more than \$67,000 for an average of \$4.89. The Ford plant is operating at capacity on war work.
