LONDON, June 7.—"We must not grumble at the new Canadian tariff," said the London Observer yesterday. "If we refuse to make a deal with Canada, she must do the best she can for herself. Lancashire will welcome the tariff. She has long complained that she could not benefit by a preference confined to goods of 50 per cent Empire origin. The words 'a substantial proportion' will now replace the obnoxious percentage limit."

British And German Foreign Ministers Met At Home of Premier MacDonal — Economic Situation Discussed.

LARGE CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION

Pontifical High Mass Was Celebrated By Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan — Parade Forms Up on Square.

The annual Corpus Christi Parade from St. Dunstan's Basilica yesterday was one of the largest ever held in the city. Following Pontifical High Mass by Bishop O'Sullivan at 10 o'clock, the procession left St. Dunstan's Basilica for Notre Dame Convent via Richmond and Weymouth Street. Assisting in the Mass were Rt. Rev. Monsignor McDonald, High Priest, Rev. James Murphy and Rev. Walter McGuigan, deacons of honour, Rev. J. A. Sullivan and Rev. George McDonald, deacon and sub-deacon of the Mass, Rev. P. McMahon, Master of Ceremonies, Eric Roblin, second master of ceremonies. The sermon on the Blessed Sacrament was preached by Rev. Father Murphy C. S. R.

The societies and congregations formed up on Hillsboro Square. The hours for all Masses at the Basilica and Church of the Most Holy Redeemer were changed so as to allow all to attend, at the Basilica the Masses were at 7, 8, 9, and 10 o'clock.

At the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer there were two Masses, 7.30 and 9 o'clock.

Benediction was given from the balcony of Notre Dame Academy where a beautifully decorated Repository had been erected by the Sisters of the Academy.

After Benediction the procession returned and proceeded to Hillsboro Square, to Water Street to Great George Street to the Basilica where Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament was again given.

The Corpus Christi Choir rendered the music 88th at the Academy and Basilica.

Trade Agreement Between Canada And Australia

OTTAWA, June 7.—The trade agreement between Australia and Canada was signed in the respective Capitals last week. It was learned here tonight. It is possible that Premier R. B. Bennett will make a statement concerning it in the House of Commons tomorrow, although no authoritative information could be obtained tonight in this regard. It is understood that arrangements are under way for simultaneous announcements in the two countries. A new pact with Australia has been under negotiation for some time. Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce had several conferences with Hon. Parker Maloney, Australian Minister of Markets, both in London during the Imperial conference and later in Ottawa, when Mr. Maloney returned by way of Canada.

The object sought by the two Governments has been to work out a series of preferences which would develop the trade between them without injuring the domestic industries of the two countries. Much criticism was leveled against the former agreement in regard to the low duty it provided in Canada against Australian butter. When Canada was not producing all the butter used in this country the question of imports of outside butter was an important one for the Canadian dairymen, because it brought down Canadian prices approximately to world prices plus the duty. Accordingly, an understanding was made with Australia to limit the amount of its butter it released on

Indication of Steady Increase in Volume of Business In Canada

OTTAWA, June 7.—Turnover of money in Canadian banks, measuring the volume of business transactions has been steadily increasing during the first four months of this year and while the volume has not been as

great as in the last three years the rate of increase has been considerably greater. In fact, in the years 1928 and 1929, a downward trend was shown during this period of the year, reflecting the period of stagnation awaiting the spring business activity.

ONE INJURED IN MOTOR ACCIDENT

Mr. Louis Berrigan Is In City Hospital In Unconscious Condition—Cars Collide at St. Peters Road Intersection.

As a result of a collision of two automobiles at the intersection of St. Peter's Road, and the road leading to Falconwood, at 6 o'clock last evening, Mr. Louis Berrigan, Dunedin, was seriously injured, necessitating his removal to the City Hospital, where at a late hour last night he was reported to be in an unconscious condition. His companion, Mr. Wallace Henderson, City, who was driver of the car also received a severe shaking up.

It appears that the Ford roadster, in which they were proceeding in an easterly direction on St. Peter's Road, struck the Essex Sedan driven by Mr. Harold Pickard, proceeding north across the intersection. The latter car was pushed some distance down the St. Peter's Road by the impact while the former was turned completely around on the highway. Both cars were demolished.

May Organize New Clubs

ROME, June 7.—A possible solution of the grave conflict between the Catholic Church and the Italian State was seen in some quarters here today in the creation of new Catholic clubs, a method which is now being tried in several dioceses of northern Italy. The location of these dioceses was temporarily withheld by the Vatican today, but it was learned that the new organizations are to be called "congregations" and that they are to be more directly connected with the Church than were the dissolved Catholic clubs.

MEMORY OF GREAT MAN IS HONORED

40th Anniversary of Death of Sir John A. MacDonal Fittingly Commemorated At Cataragui Cemetery, Kingston, Ont.

KINGSTON, Ont., June 7.—Marking the 40th anniversary of the death of Sir John A. MacDonal, Conservative chief and "Father of Confederation" members of the Kingston Conservative Association yesterday decorated his grave at Cataragui Cemetery with a wreath of flowers.

Sir John, the first Prime Minister of Canada, under Confederation, died June 6, 1891.

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 6.—Mrs. Annie Urquhart Stillman obtained a divorce yesterday from James A. Stillman and was immediately married to Fowler McCormick of the wealthy and socially eminent Chicago family. The marriage of Mrs. Stillman and Mr. McCormick conducted by Supreme Court Justice Graham, Westchester County, United a woman of 51 and a man of 32.

Mr. McCormick is the son of Harold F. McCormick and Edith Rockefeller McCormick. He is the grandson of Cyrus H. McCormick and John D. Rockefeller.

British Press Commends Budget

Commends, "First Its Courageous Facing Up Of Facts And Next Its Persistence In Policy Of Preference For British Goods."

LONDON, June 7.—"The attitude of Canada toward empire trade is more than a gesture," says the Financial Times today in referring to the Canadian budget presented by Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, premier and minister of finance, in the Dominion parliament yesterday. The fact that tariff alterations are made so as to affect only in minor degree the British preference "throws into relief the reality of the attachment of the Canadian statesman to the idea of imperial development," the Financial Times continues.

The newspaper emphasizes, however, the fact that the Dominion in thus "keeping the door open" does not necessarily mean that she would feel able to do so in all circumstances. It is a response of the policy of this country to the opportunities offered.

"Canada looks ahead" is the heading of the Morning Post Leader on the budget. The newspaper says it is inevitable that Canada should be heavily affected by the cataclysm which has befallen the United States, but the notable thing was that the Dominion had stood the shock so well. Any doubt regarding Canada's power to recuperate should be dispelled by the triumphant success of her recent conversion scheme.

What chiefly impresses the Morning Post in Mr. Bennett's budget is "first, its courageous facing up of facts and next its persistence in the policy of preference for British goods."

THE IMPERIAL CONFERENCE IS ADJOURNED

Was To Have Been Held In Ottawa This Fall — Pending Elections In Australia And New Zealand Cause of Postponement.

QUEBEC, Que., June 6.—The adjourned session of the Imperial Conference which was to have been held in Ottawa this fall, has been adjourned, Premier Bennett stated when shown despatches from London stating that such action was likely. An official statement to this effect will be made by the Prime Minister in the House of Commons on Monday.

The conference had been postponed, Mr. Bennett said, because of pending elections in Australia and New Zealand which would prevent delegates from these two countries attending this fall. No date has been set for the renewal of the discussions the Prime Minister stated, but it was likely to be the beginning of the next year. Mr. Bennett left for Ottawa shortly after noon following the funeral of Cardinal Rouleau, which he attended.
