Farmers in this district will be interested in the new ensilage cutter which has been installed on the farm of Lincoln Dewar at New Perth for a company in that district which is growing corn. Amateurs who will use the new cutter besides Mr. Dewar are Mr. James Cain, Mr. George Kennedy and others. It is reported that eight acres of land under corn, and has already constructed his silo which is 12 feet in diameter and 30 feet high and will contain over 3,300 cubic feet of silage. The new cutters weigh about one ton and is placed on a four-wheel base for transportation. It is operated by tractor, and is driven at a speed of 800 R.P.M. Attached to it at right angles is a feeding table on an endless chain which carries the corn to the cutting blades which are two feet long and six inches wide. After the corn has been cut, it is blown up to the top of the silo by a blower attachment on the cutter. An attachment for adding molasses may be attached to the cutter and another for sharpening knives. Every precaution has been taken to ensure safety while working about the machine, and a near-by safety release will put the machine quickly out of gear. It may also be reversed should the silage feeder become clogged so as to clear the passage. This new cutter will do much in providing ample winter feed for a large stock, and will be of great benefit to the farmers who are planting more and more acreage under corn. It is understood that a similar cutter is to be installed in Summerside in the near future.

On September 9th, a special meeting of the Montague Legion was held at the Legion Hall to discuss ways and means of raising money with the purpose of improving the Legion Home, and also to build up a cash reserve to assist needy veterans and their families. During past years the Legion has been instrumental in assisting many who have been in need and this splendid work demands the assistance of all, and their efforts should be supported in every way. It was decided that if the Curling Rink was available the Legion would hold a carnival with which to foster their purposes. Both the Community Welfare League and the Curling Club were only too glad to offer the Curling Rink for this benevolent purpose. The ladies of the Beaver Club also offered the use of their kitchen for canteen purposes. At the meeting a committee was chosen comprising A. F. Campbell, chairman, E. V. MacKinnon, Russell MacGregor, G.W. MacDonald and A.E. Sullivan. This committee met on the 20th of September and set the dates for the carnival which is to be held on October 7, 8 and 9th, and further drew up a program of entertainment which it is proposed will consist of bingo, wheels of fortune, fish ponds, indoor horse racing, guessing contests, lotteries, band, pipe and old-time music, sword dancing, step dancing, nice racing, weight-lifting, spill-the-milk, and many other attractions. Carnivals were held in the Curling Rink in 1945 and 1946 and were supported to the utmost by the people of the district. It is recalled that on the last night of the previous carnival, over 900 people attended making a record crowd for one night. These carnivals were put on by the Community Welfare League, and the receipts were used to improve and foster many community projects, particularly the Community Rink, and playground equipment for the school children. This year the Legion has an equally worthy cause, and with the excellent program which they are preparing, their efforts will undoubtedly be equally supported. Although the carnival will run only three nights, every effort is being made to make each night as interesting as possible, and a good time is assured all who plan to attend. - Lan.

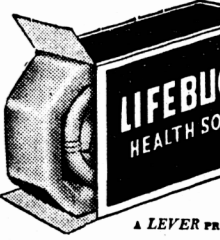

Egg And Poultry Market Report

Egg production on Prince Edward Island is still showing a seasonal decline although less rapid than in previous years due to pullets coming into production. States Mr. F. M. Nash, Supervising Poultry Products Inspector. Quality is showing some improvement in certain sections due to no doubt to prevailing cooler weather. All surplus stocks are being moved to other Maritime points and Newfoundland with a view to moving to breaking plants in Quebec.

Disease Control

From the standpoint of disease control it is important that the laying house be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected before moving pullets into it in the fall. Droppings, litter, and other manure should be removed with shovel and scraper and the ceilings, walls and floor swept with a stiff broom. It is then desirable to soak the floor thoroughly so that the remaining dirt may be scrubbed away. This procedure should be followed by scrubbing walls, floors and fixtures with a hot lye solution made by dissolving one pound of lye in thirty gallons of water. When this is dry, it is advisable to apply a reliable disinfectant, such as lye in two or three per cent solution, chlorinated lime in the proportion of six ounces to each gallon of water, or one of the many commercial preparations available on the market.

The cleaning and disinfecting of the poultry house must be done thoroughly, with great care taken not to over look the cracks and corners. If neglected, these may provide excellent hiding places for disease germs and parasites. Round poles are not altogether desirable as roosts because they have a tendency to check on drying and this makes them difficult to clean. Lengths of 2 x 4 inch scantling, rounded on the upper edges, are therefore preferable. These should be placed about 16 inches from the rear wall of the building and about 14 inches apart. About eight or nine inches of roosting space should be allowed for each bird.
