PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 23.—The 1930 N. W. Ayer's and Sons Directory of Newspapers and Periodicals, just off the press, lists 22,269 publications, a decrease of 350 from last year. This decrease according to the publishers is accounted for by mergers and consolidations.

These consolidations have resulted in producing, for the most part, publications of greater stability, better quality and larger circulation," they said.

The weekly field showed most of the decrease with a drop of 404. Daily newspapers showed a gain of 35. The estimated aggregate circulation of all daily newspapers in the United States and Canada is set at 44,110,094, a gain of nearly four million over last year.

The weekly field showed most of the decrease with a drop of 404. Daily newspapers showed a gain of 35. The estimated aggregate circulation of all daily newspapers in the United States and Canada is set at 44,110,094, a gain of nearly four million over last year.

To induce farmers of Bulgaria to use tractors the government is launching a campaign for deep plowing, which cannot be accomplished by use of light draft animals.
