STEELE TRUST INVESTIGATION  
WASHINGTON, June 14—Determined to discover why the United States Steel Corporation could sell steel rails abroad cheaper than at home, the "Steel Trust" investigation committee of the House today practically announced its intention of summoning James A. Farrell, President of the Corporation to explain the situation. James Gayley, former vice president of the Corporation acknowledged he could not tell and referred the committee to Mr. Farrell who for years had been in charge of the export business of the concern.

LABOR DISPUTES  
OTTAWA, June 14—Seven labor disputes are being investigated at present by conciliation boards. They include the cases of the Western Coal operators, the Great North-western Telegraph operators, John Ritchie, W. A. Marsh, Gale Brothers and J. N. Stobo, shoe manufacturers, Quebec, Sunby Mining Company, Cowganda and the Canadian Northern dock employers, Port Arthur, and disputes between electrical workers and the cities of Port Arthur, Fort William and Edmonton.

THE MIKADO OF JAPAN AS A POET  
LONDON, June 14—The Emperor of Japan has written a poem commemorating the coronation of King George. Here is a translation of it—  
"When nations speak to nation in tones of friendly greeting—  
Tis joy to hear—  
When nations dwell in peace beneath the sway of wise good rulers;  
Tis joy to see."  
FELL DOWN A WELL WERE INSTANTLY KILLED  
LONDON, June 13—Elias and Warren Hicks, two pulp makers, met a terrible death here yesterday when they fell down a 60-foot well. They were putting in a new pump on the farm of George Jackson. It was thought they must have opened a natural gas vein, which overcame them and they pitched headlong into the well. The body of one brother caught on a platform about forty feet down and the other brother fell the full sixty feet.

FORESTERS IN SESSION  
TORONTO, June 14—Two hundred delegates had arrived today to attend the 32nd annual convention of the Canadian Order of Foresters, which opened yesterday afternoon. When all the delegates have arrived the attendance will be over 500. Yesterday's session was devoted to the reception of the court officers. The business of the convention will be continued today. It was said by one of the High Court officers that the question of a revision of the order's insurance rates would not be raised at the present convention.

MEET TERRIBLE DEATH  
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WIFE'S DEATH CAUSED HIM TO KILL HIMSELF  
HAMILTON, June 14—Grief over the death of his wife, who died yesterday, caused Wm. Lampan, 73 years old to hang himself early this morning, within a few feet of where lay the body of his life companion for over fifty years. Lampan had been married over half a century and his wife was a most devoted couple, being as much attached to each other as the day he led her to the altar. The old man was greatly depressed during his wife's illness and when the end came nothing could reconcile him. He hung to the coffin all day and sobbed as if his heart would break.

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
